NEW PHAGAN EVIDENCE FOUND Chemist Found Poison in Crawford's Body

SENSATION IN FIGHT OVER FORTUNE

Expert Testifies Pneumonia Was Not Cause of Death of Carrollton Capitalist.

That opium and morphine in large quantities were found in the stomach of the late J. B. Crawford and that his lungs showed no trace of having died from pneumonia, was the sensational evidence of Dr. H. C. Harris of the State Board of Health, given at the hearing of the contest of the Crawford will involving \$500,000 before Colonel J. A. Anderson, acting as auditor, Wednesday morning.

The testimony was introduced to strengthen the allegation made in the petition of the Crawford heirs, that Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford, of 674 West Peachtree, the widow and chief executrix of the late Mr. J. B. Crawford, produced the death of the deceased by the continued administration of narcotic and opium.

Previous to the introduction as a witness of Dr. Harris the only testimony which had been introduced to substantiate the sensational allegation, was the statement of one witness that she saw Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford take a vial from her belt and give her husband several drops of a peculiar looking fluid. The fluid was administered, the witness stated, in the presence of several people.

Albert Kemper, attorney for the Carrollton County, examined the body of Crawford at the family cemetery in that county, last June 11, four years after the funeral, and for the first time told in the courtroom Wednesday the result of the chemical analysis of the contents of the stomach and the tissues.

Albert Kemper, attorney for the heirs-at-law, said that while the present proceeding was strictly civil that it was not improbable a more exhaustive investigation of the poisoning story would be made and that indictments might be sought before the Grand Jury.

Crawford married his second wife, Mrs. M. B. Crawford, in February, 1899, and died in March of the same year. His physician, Dr. J. W. Hurl, who is also the coroner's physician for Fulton County, gave a post-mortem cause of death.

In a will that was probated by Mrs. M. B. Crawford she named sole heir for the large estate, The Heirs-at-law, named some twenty or thirty, contested the will, and some angle of it has been in court since.

PART OF PAY ENVELOPE HELD BY POLICE

Two sensational developments marked the Phagan case Wednesday. One was the testimony of Miss Mattie Smith, an employee of the National Envelope factory, that she had seen a negro sitting on the first floor of the factory between 9 and 10 o'clock, as when the original party had been there. The second was the announcement of the finding of a part of a pay envelope destined to be the envelope of Mary Phagan.

A piece of an envelope bearing Mary Phagan's number was found on the first floor of the National Envelope factory behind a radiator, only a few feet from where Jim Conley was seen to enter the plant, on the morning of the day the fatal factory accident occurred, according to information made public Wednesday afternoon.

Robbery Again Suspected.

The strange discovery in the strangling mystery is believed more strongly than ever to point to robbery as the original motive for the attack upon the girl and to turn suspicion more directly upon Conley.

One corner of the envelope was found behind a radiator where the person who attacked Mary Phagan presumably threw it to go away with any evidence against him. Her number was found upon it, according to the testimony of the police.

Miss Smith told a Georgian reporter that she saw a negro there, it was between 9 and 10 o'clock. She thought she might be asked to identify Conley, if she identifies the negro, it will disprove Conley's statement that he did not go to the factory until after he had met Frank Statton.

Justice W. D. Hill Wednesday morning, in his opinion on the writ of habeas corpus to liberate New Lee, made reference to the Phagan murder mystery.

The action came as the result of an agreement reached between Graham Chappell, attorneys for Lee, and Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey, if he is believed to mark the end of all efforts to gain the negro's freedom before the trial of Leo M. Frank July 29.

The most unexpected person in the courtroom was New Lee. He was brought before Judge Hill by Deputy Sheriff Miller.

"I don't make no difference to me whether I am inside or outside the jail," he said to a reporter. "I'm just as the white folks say, 'I don't know what all this is that's going on. I know that my church offered to get me a lawyer. I guess this Mr. Chappell must be the one.'"

Chappell did not appear in the courtroom. Lee was represented by C. J. Graham, Chappell's law partner, who left for Chicago to attend the story of the sensational suicide of Mrs. Nellie Ashagoo, of Chicago, who leaped from the hurricane deck of the Lake Michigan when the boat was ten miles out of Chicago.

SEISATIONIN FIGHT OVER FORTUNE

Expert Testifies Pneumonia Was Not Cause of Death of Carrollton Capitalist

That opium and morphine in large quantities were found in the stomach of the late J. B. Crawford and that his lungs showed no trace of his having contracted pneumonia, was the sensational evidence of Dr. R. C. Harris of the State Board of Health, given at the hearing of the contest of the Crawford will involving \$300,000 before Colonel J. A. Anderson, acting as auditor, Wednesday morning.

The testimony was introduced to strengthen the allegation made in the petition of the "Crawford heirs" that Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford, of 37 West Peachtree, the widow and chief beneficiary of the Crawford will, produced the death of the deceased by the continued administration of narcotics and intoxicants.

The fluid was administered, the witness stated, in the presence of several people.

Albert Kemper, attorney for the Carrollton family, examined the body of Crawford at the family cemetery in that county, just some 12 years after the funeral, and for the first time told in the courtroom Wednesday, the result of the chemical analysis of the contents of the stomach and the tissues.

In a will that was produced by Mrs. M. B. Crawford, in February, 1909, and died in March of the same year, his physician, Dr. J. W. Harris, who is also the coroner's physician for Fulton County, gave pneumonia as the cause of death.

SENSATIONS IN STORY OF GIRL VICTIM

That sufficient evidence had been produced in court to make a case against one of the city's most prominent business men was the statement of Recorder Broyles Wednesday afternoon at the trial of the persons involved in the latest vice scandal.

Leona Barnhardt, alleged white slave and procurer, was bound over to the higher court under a bond of \$100.

Hattie Smith, who victim in court to be a white slave, claimed of the Barnhardt woman, was placed under \$100 bond for the higher court.

Clyde Cox, who is alleged to have been trapped with the Smith girl, was put under the same bond.

Ellish Murray, colored hallboy at the Cumberland Hotel, who the Smith girl testified, had arranged rates for the women inmates of the hotel, was held in default of \$100 bond.

Hattie Smith repeated the sensational story she previously had told to the detectives in regard to her meeting with the Barnhardt woman, and of the manner in which she was lured into a life of shame.

As the girl testified, she revealed a systematic white slave system carried on in some of the city's hotels, the girl's most startling revelation had to do with the prominent business man whose name she mentioned in open court.

The girl testified that she had seen the man named in room 40 at the Cumberland Hotel, occupied by the Barnhardt woman. She said that he was able positively to identify him. Recorder Broyles declared the evidence was sufficient to make a case against him.
