# COTTON COES UP

New York. April 3—The cotton market was quiet today, but showed a steadier tone, and closed steady at a net advance of 6000 points. Sales were estimated at 150,000 bales. The market opened steady as unchanged prices to an advance of 3 points in response to atsady cables, and improved during the day, and some fresh buying for long account, which seemed to be the result of a better feeling regarding conditions in manufacturing and spot circles, although there was nothing to explain this in the news beyond refterations of a steadier tone in the interior markets and reports of a better demand from spinners. At one time prices were about soil opinits higher on the active months, and the close was only a point or two off from the best on these positions. Southern apot markets were generally unchanged, and the into-sight figures proved about as expected with local statisticians looking for a favorable visible supply statement tomorrow. Much of the trading during the day was supposed to be for straidle account, and there was some buying of May and selling of later months when May showed a large premium. The weather map showed rather low femperatures in the south, but it was considered early for cold weather to lurit the crop autlook, and otherwise conditions were believed to be favorable.


