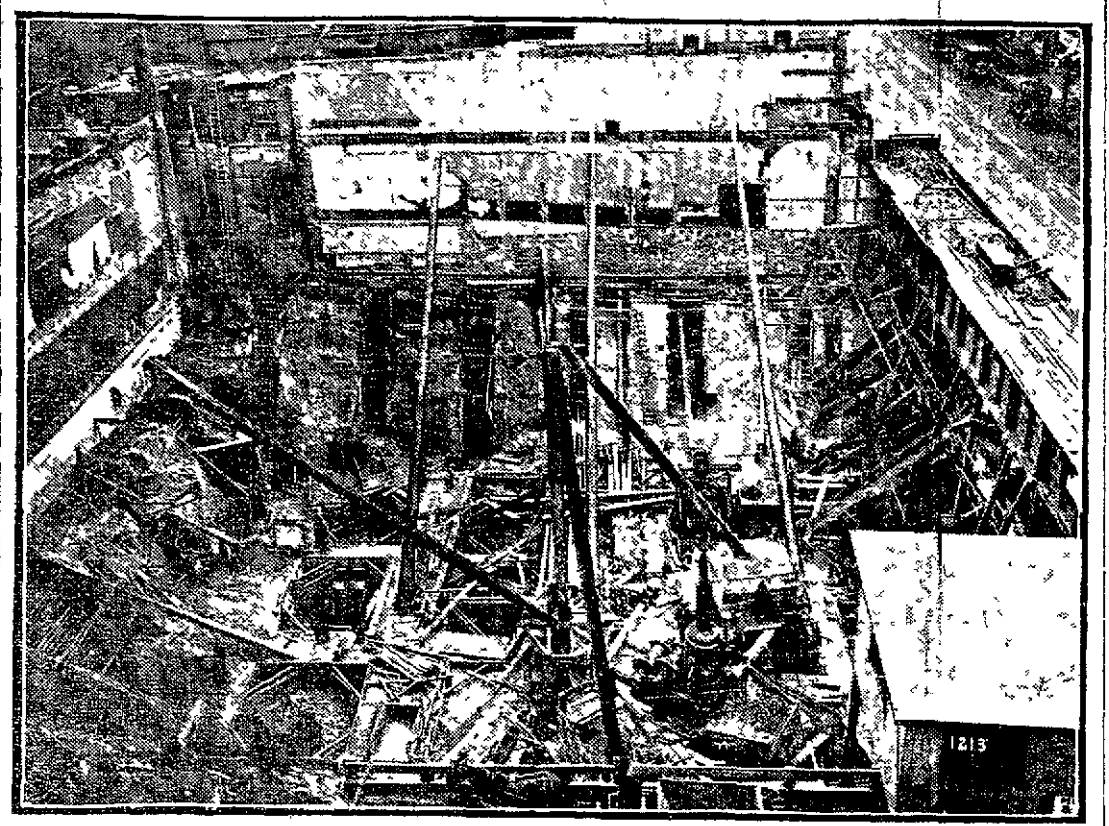

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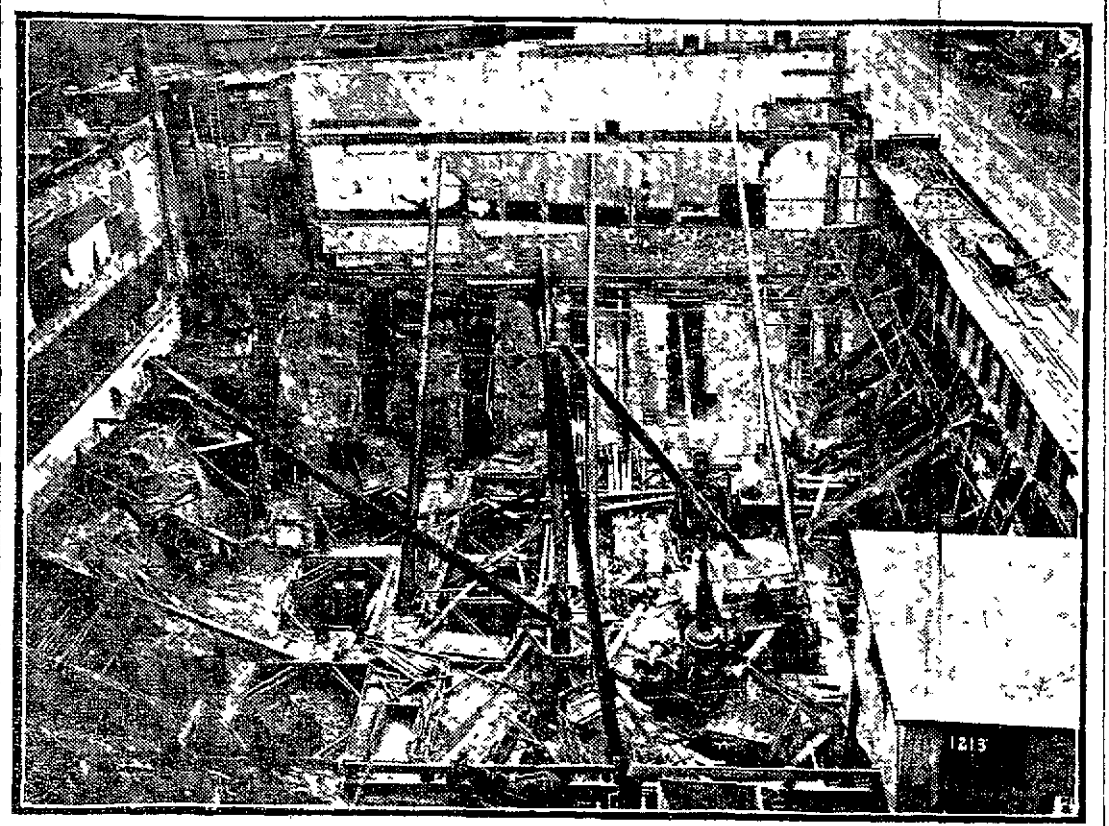

Recently the Russians announced important successes, although these claims have not been corroborated in Vienna. Fighting in the Beskids has been severe recently. Yesterday's Austrian statement said it had been ascertained that all the Russian divisions released in the Beskid mountains were now on the Carpathian front.

GREAT SUCCESS FOR RUSSIANS

Petrograd, April 1.—(Via London April 1 15 a m.)—The following official communication was issued today from the front to the west of the Niemen river (north Poland): The fighting is developing greatly in our favor. Our cavalry on the road between Kalynda and Sawaiki in the region of the village of Zolotobudzie after a stubborn fight Friday with German cavalry which was supported by infantry made a dashing charge, sweeping many of the enemy and capturing others. They drove the Germans from the region they were occupying and are now pursuing them.

In the Carpathians on Friday we gained a great success in the sector north of the road leading to Barilido and also in the region between Vozoloborze and Lutoviska.

During that day we captured on the Carpathian front more than 2000 soldiers and three guns and three machine guns.

In the Zalesatru region the Austrians escaped an offensive, but all their attacks failed completely. We captured two officers and about 100 men.

In the direction of Chokik after the grave defeat inflicted on them March 29 by portions of our cavalry who defeated an irresistible attack while on foot the Austrians evacuated our territory and withdrew to their frontier where they are fortifying themselves.

In the battle of the 9th our cavalry showed unexpected bravery in attacking while about enemy infantry units with bayonet, rifle and lance. A Turkish soldier believed to be the Medvedich struck one of our mines and blew up and sank.

TONGUE CUT OUT BY THE AUSTRIANS

London, April 1.—(Via London April 1 15 a m.)—A Heuter correspondent sends the following:

A dispatch from the commander in chief received tonight (Sunday) says in the region of Zalesatru the Austrians violently bombarded one of our fortifications with heavy guns, inflicting the killing of all the defenders. The Austrian infantry then attacked and occupied our positions, but they almost immediately were dislodged by a counter attack made by a Russian company.

The Russians found in a trench one of their comrades named Makuksa whom the Austrians had captured and horribly mutilated. Makuksa had been working as a telephone operator and having refused to give the enemy information he was doing, he was executed. The commander-in-chief promoted Makuksa on the spot to rank as a non-commissioned officer and conferred on him the Cross of St. George first class. He also expressed to Makuksa personal gratitude and commended his case to the attention of the emperor for a double rate of pay.

AUSTRIAN FORCES CUT TO PIECES.

London, April 1.—(Via London April 1 15 a m.)—A Heuter dispatch from Petrograd gives a semi-official account of the retreat of the Austrian forces which penetrated Bessarabia. It says:

The Austrians were defeated in a part annihilated a division of Austrian infantry and a brigade of cavalry held an organized position near the village of Schelby and killed 2000. Two columns of Russian infantry attacked them and enveloped their front on the morning of the 21st. The Austrians then began a retreat along the whole front.

The enemy resisted desperately, while the Russian troops delivered many assaults with the heaviest losses. In some places the Austrians also used cold steel and the heights were carried.

Meanwhile at the village of Bolik, some 80 miles north in the Austrian force was driven out by Cossacks with the bayonet. The Austrians then began a retreat along the whole front.

GUERRILLA WAR ON GIANT SCALE

Berlin, April 1.—(Via London April 1 15 a m.)—A description of conditions under which guerrilla fighting is being waged in the Carpathians is contained in a dispatch to The National Zeitung, which says the fighting is being carried out in a most vicious manner, but that it is so broken up by mountains and forests that the conflict resembles guerrilla warfare on a colossal scale.

Unable to see parts of the territory involved, combat often had to be necessary to abandon a position gained at heavy loss because its view is cut off from other sections of the battle line. Although the Russians are constantly bringing up fresh troops and making considerable sacrifices, the correspondent says their onslaught has been checked at Duika.

SERBIA STIRRED BY BULGAR RAID

Paris, April 4.—The Serbian government has protested to the government of Bulgaria because of the invasion of Serbian territory by Bulgarian irregular troops, according to The Press Journal. While couched in moderate terms, the protest is said to request the arrest and imprisonment of those responsible.

Further details of the incident received today confirm the report that the raiders were driven away from the railroad station at Strumitsa, the Serbian town near the Bulgarian border where the attack was made. The railway station master at Strumitsa reports that at the line of Ghelbent is now clear of the raiders and apparently has not been damaged.

Captured Cannon Retaken

Serbian frontier guards who pursued the fleeing irregulars retook two captured cannon.

Six bodies were found in the railway station at Strumitsa. The extent of the loss inflicted in the attacks is reported to be unknown. The bodies were found and buried on the spot.

This is said to be the fifth raid of its kind since the beginning of the Serbian war and the first since the capture of the town of Strumitsa. The raid is said to have been the work of the Serbian irregulars.

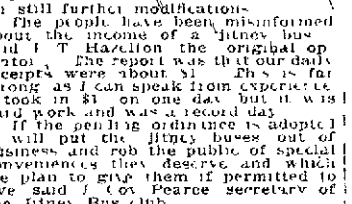

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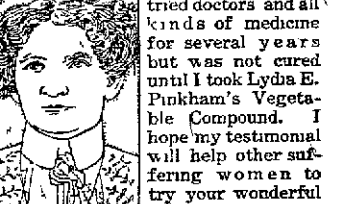
