British Cabinet Ministers Practically Tell House of Commons That Time Has Arrived for Big Effort in War.

BY SEA AND BY LAND ATTACK WILL BE MADE BY THE ALLIED FORCES

Britain Stops Steamboat Communication With Holland—British Submarines Are Operating in the Bight of Helgoland—Big Land Force Ready to Attack Turks.

London April 22.—Glowing accounts of the strength and condition of the British arm and of the great increase in the output of munitions which it is expected, next month will amount to twenty-five times what it was last September given by David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, and Harold J. Tennant, parliamentary secretary of the war office in the house of commons have increased enthusiasm and confidence of the people of England in the war.

Supplementing the chancellor's statement that Great Britain has more than thirty-five divisions of troops—roughly 700,000 men—on the continent, and that the output of munitions has increased enormously, Mr. Tennant today speaking on behalf of the secretary of war, Lord Kitchener, declared that recruiting had been most satisfactory and gratifying that the health of the troops was excellent and that the food had been in the London hotels for the last four hours after they were taken in France. He wished to impress on the country the necessity of using the supplies of war munitions to the utmost. There is no limit to the amount required.

Big Drive About to Begin

The Franking of the cabinet minutes in making known the number of men at the front and the reports that reach London from various sources have convinced the people that at last the effort against Germany and Turkey is about to commence. Both in the east and in the north there are signs of increasing activity. From today all the main communication with Holland is stopped by order of the British government.

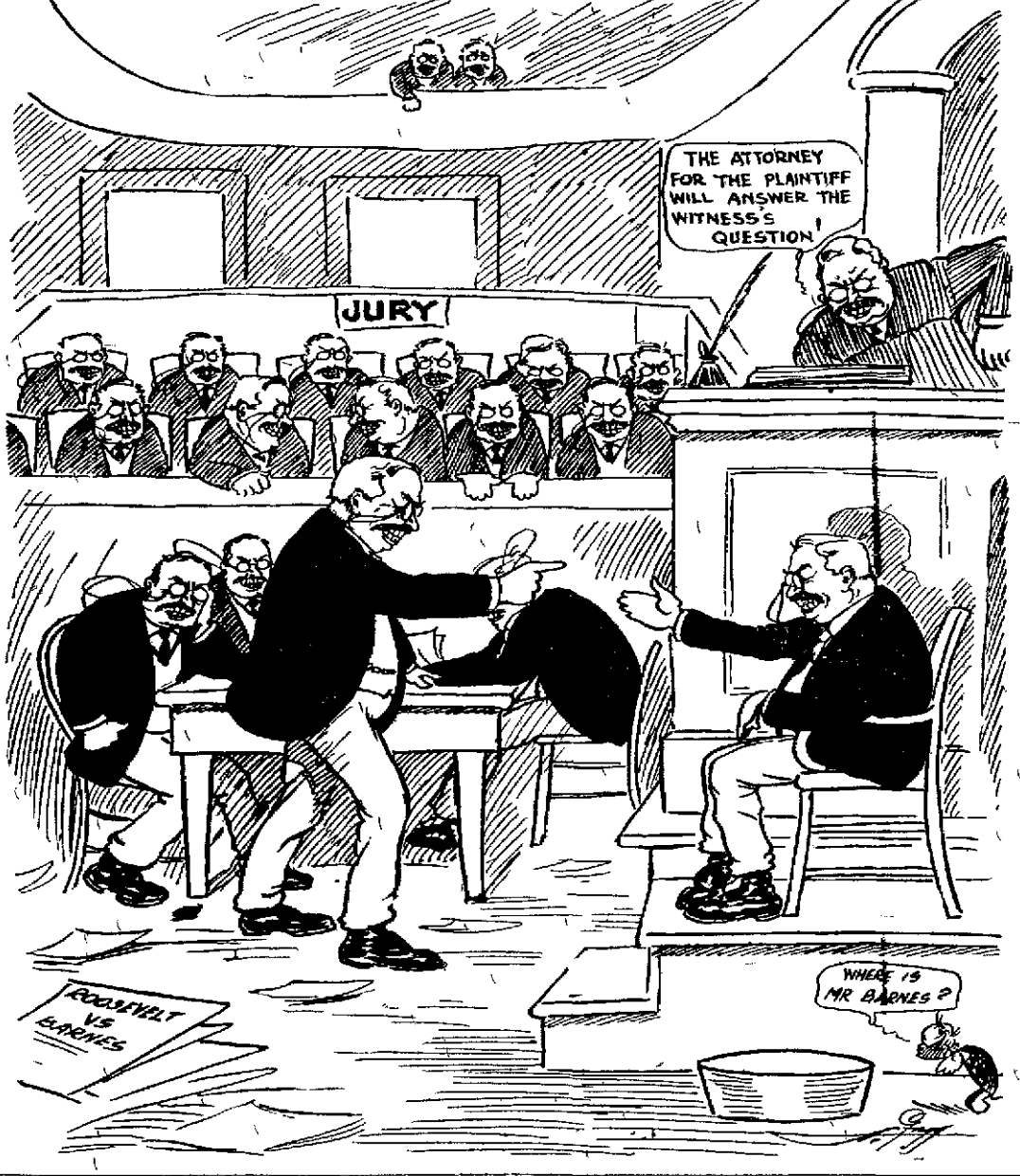

Mrs. Miller received notice last week from Dr. Hollander that her services would not be needed after May 1 and on Monday of this week she made complaint to the city officials in charge of the sanitarium.

The committee spent Thursday an investigation into the payroll and bills for supplies, nurses and other employees of the institution appeared before the committee and their testimony was taken down by stenographers.

It is charged that these irregularities began last June or nearly one year ago, said Dr. Kennedy, and that means that considerable time and work will be required to go over the books.

When the charges were made by Mrs. Miller, a complaint was submitted to the committee in charge of the sanitarium and composed of Mayor Woodward, Aldermen Edward Dunlap, Dr. J. P. Kennedy, Dr. Claude A. Smith and Dr. V. L. Gilbert.

The sub-committee will make a detailed report to the grand committee but until this report is submitted they state that nothing will be known of what further action will be taken.

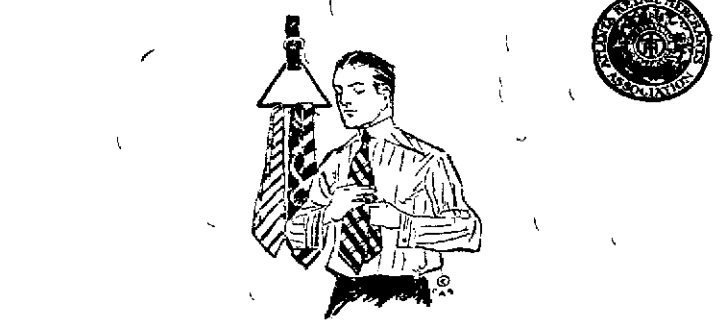

INNES AND WIFE WIN LEGAL POINT

Delay Their Coming to Georgia Through Successful Appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

San Antonio, Texas (April 22)—(Spe cial)—Victor L. Innes and his wife in fall here pending extradition to Georgia on charges of larceny after trial have succeeded in getting the United States supreme court to grant their application for a writ of error and it is probable that several months will elapse before final action is taken in the high court.
