PROPERTY LOSS TOTALS MILLIONS.

Dallas, Texas, August 18.—Galveston has emerged from one of the most severe storms in the annals of the Gulf of Mexico, battered and sorely burdened with financial loss, but with the known loss of life less than a definite

supply of drinking water, the main leading to the city's supply wells at Alto Loma, 18 miles away, having been broken.

Storm Reached Zenith.

The belated report of today says that the storm reached its zenith at 3 o'clock Tuesday morning, with a wind velocity of 93 miles an hour, before which the frail wood cottages which ornament the boulevard along the sea wall crumbled and scattered into flying timbers.

Less to Port Facilities.

The loss to the city port facilities has been enormous and all kinds of craft have suffered.

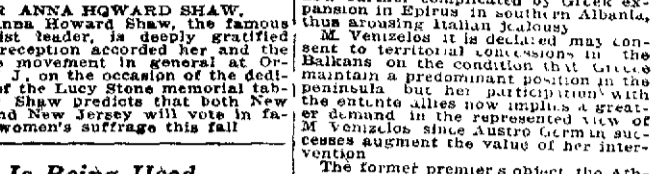

WORKING ON LOAN FOR GREAT BRITAIN

Big Reduction to Be Made in Amount of Issue—About \$150,000,000 Will Be Offered.

New York, August 18.—A reduction in the proposed foreign loan, to be floated here, from the half billion dollars first suggested to \$150,000,000 or \$160,000,000, seemed probable tonight as the result of all-day conferences of international financiers here and by cable between New York and London.

Campbell & Co. were not found in New York and are not known there.
