GOVERNORS URGE NATIONAL DEFENSE

Addresses Favoring Adequate Preparation Against Invasion Made at Boston. Next Convention to Salt Lake.

Boston, August 27.—After discussion of the naval and military resources of the country, it was generally agreed that the United States was not adequately prepared against foreign invasion, the conference of governors ended its annual sessions today. No resolutions were proposed, but several executives said they felt certain all the governors would return with the intention of demanding from their congressmen support in any program for strengthening the national defense.

The governors chose Salt Lake City for next year's meeting and elected the governor of Utah, William Spry, chairman of the executive committee. Other committee members elected were Governor Henry C. Stuart, of Virginia, and Governor Arthur Capper, of Kansas. Former Governor John Franklin Fort, of New Jersey, again was chosen treasurer, and Miles C. Riley, of Madison, Wis., was re-elected secretary.

The conference program, which had included a review of the Atlantic fleet and a parade of the Massachusetts militia, had aroused great interest in today's discussion. The sessions were removed to a spacious hall and a big audience followed the addresses.

Secretary of Commerce Redfield, speaking not in behalf of the administration but as a member of it, he said, urged restraint of speech and soberness of thought in what he termed these trying times.

"With that spirit of restraint," he said, "should we not be ready for any emergency of any kind that may arise? Should we not at least have the tools ready, not for offense, but for our defense of our nation?"

Governors Urged Preparedness. Governor Fielder of New Jersey, urged an increase in the standing army by at least 25,000 men with an adequate line of trained reserves. He said he felt the states should be ready at all times to furnish 250,000 men to this reserve body.

Cordial agreement with Governor Fielder's statement was expressed by Governor Dunne, of Illinois, who said he felt the nation's reliance for a reserve force might well be found in a variety of receiving funds, federal or state, should give four years of military training to its students.

If war were declared on the United States by any of the principal European nations, he said, Governor Dunne said that the United States should be ready to take possession or destroy all means of manufacturing ammunition in the United States within 150 miles of New York city.

Board to Inform Congress. Governor Hammond, of Minnesota, expressed the belief that an extension of the subject of preparedness, "holding a suspicion that if need arose we would find these battleships of ours giving a very good account of themselves." It was his opinion that the nation must depend largely on the patriotism of its people for defense, that "the men would not stand for compulsory military service and the nation cannot afford to hire its soldiers."

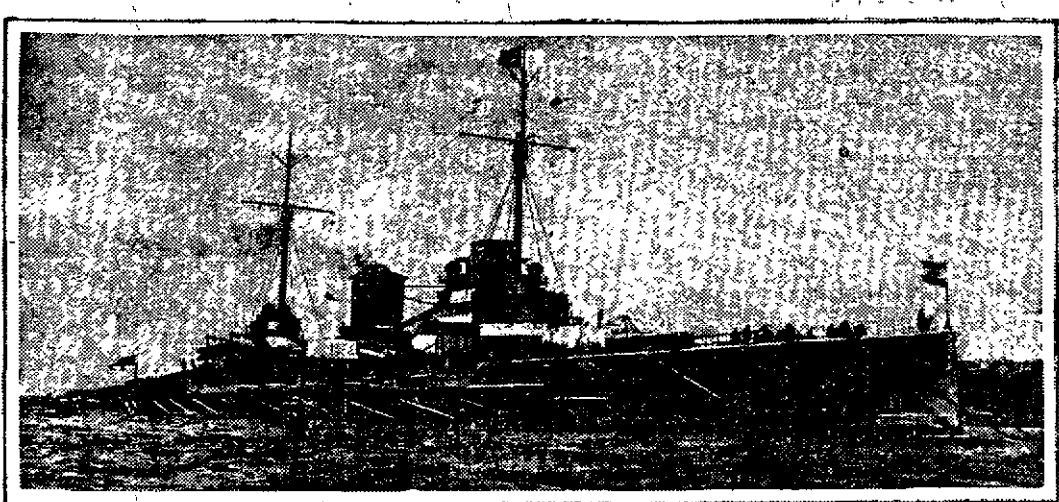
Governor Goldsborough, of Maryland, expressed the belief that an extension of measures of defense was necessary.

Governor Trammell, of Florida, felt that dependence was to be placed in the citizen soldiery and was applauded when he said "if the European war lasts two years more, as seems likely, there will not be a first-class army or navy in the world except our own."

Adequate Preparation Urged. Adequate preparedness was urged by Governor Stuart, of Massachusetts, who came the suggestion that state or federal provision be made for bringing into the schools encouragement and opportunity for the boys of the land to develop as citizen soldiers.

A new note was struck by Francis E. McGovern, former governor of Wisconsin, who has been mentally reformed, he exclaimed, by this international propaganda for peace, as it has been rampant in America. Our people have been over-persuaded by

CRUISER MOLTKE GREATLY ADMIRIED WHEN SHE PAID A VISIT TO AMERICA



MOLTKE AND SAILORS ON DECK.

The German battle cruiser Moltke, reported sunk in the battle of Riga, aroused admiration for her graceful lines when she visited New York in 1912. She was 610 feet long, with a displacement of 22,840 tons and a speed of 28 1/2 knots. She was completed in 1912 and carried ten 11-inch, twelve 5.9-inch and twelve 3.4-inch guns. In addition, she had four 20-inch torpedo tubes, and was said to have cost more than \$12,000,000. The Moltke visited this country to return the visit to Kiel of the American battleship squadron that made the trip around the world. She carried a complement of 1,107 officers and men. She first became noted in the war when she was in battle with the British North sea fleet last January in the engagement in which the German cruiser Bluecher was sunk.

This movement which has dubbed the officers of our state militia "tin soldiers" and has removed the incentive of officer and man. I believe there is little danger to the nation today as at any time in a score of years. Nevertheless, we can never be secure until we put the country in a state of real preparedness, such as its vast interests demand.

HAITI SOON TO RATIFY PROTECTORATE TREATY

Washington, August 27.—Prompt ratification of the proposed American protectorate treaty by the Haitian parliament was forecast today in state department dispatches from Charge D'Affaires at Port au Prince, President D'Arctignave, head of the new government, is committed to the convention and is believed to have assurances of support from senators and delegates to get favorable action within a few days.

It became known today that plans of the United States for putting Haiti in order contemplate calling on the war department, if necessary, to furnish officers for the island police from its corps of non-commissioned officers who have developed and commanded the Philippine constabulary.

American marines will remain on the island pending setting up of the machinery of the protectorate. Some opposition is expected from the religious element on the north, but little real trouble is looked for.

Strikers Close Canneries.

Pass Christian, Miss., August 27.—A large cannery company here and another at Biloxi, Miss. announced today they would close their plants for this season owing to troubles between striking members of the International Longshoremen's Union and shrimp packers. Packers received reports that armed strikers Wednesday held up four shrimp schooners and seized the fishermen's seines and skiffs.

SLAYING OF PREACHER SHROUDED IN MYSTERY

Gary, Ind., August 27.—Rev. Edmund A. M. Kayser, who was killed at Tolleston, a suburb, last Tuesday night, was buried today, the mystery surrounding his death apparently still impenetrable. The body, bound with cord, was discovered in the yard of his home, near the church or which he was the pastor. The arrest of Thomas Modjesch, an inspector at the Gary Steel mills, and a statement by State Attorney Clyde Hunter that Kayser was slain by his own revolver as a result of a quarrel over business matters with persons who called on him the night of the murder, furnished today's developments.

The nature of information leading up to the arrest of Modjesch was guarded by Police Chief Heintz, who said he merely wished to question the man.

Chief of Police Heintz said he had not discovered whether the clergyman was killed because of his pro-German utterances or for other reasons.

Elmer Leroy, an Englishman, said to have denounced Kayser in his church some weeks ago, was taken into custody, but was released.

E. W. Andree, president of the German Alliance in Gary, Ind., late tonight asserted that after investigation he had come to the conclusion that Kayser was murdered by a sympathizer of the allies because of the pastor's alleged denunciation of England, Russia and France.

Andree said that Kayser had repeatedly said that he feared his life was in danger as a result of his utterances.

THREE NIGHT RIDERS GIVEN TERMS IN PEN

Hartford, Ky., August 27.—Three men who pleaded guilty in Ohio county circuit court to being members of a band of night riders, the so-called "possum hunters" that for months spread terror throughout this part of western Kentucky, tonight are serving sentences in the state prison. One other was acquitted yesterday and 66 defendants are awaiting trial.

Reuben Howard, a merchant, and his wife were whipped at Horton June 12. He sought to get a three-year sentence as Jerry Clark and Ernest Webster, who participated in the whipping, had done earlier in the week. Commonwealth Attorney Ringo, however, insisted on a five-year sentence. Reisinger, Clark and Webster were taken to prison after Reisinger accepted the longer term.

Argument on Rate Case.

Washington, August 27.—The interstate commerce commission today set October 15 for hearing arguments on so-called "official classification" cases and export grain cases, which involve proposed increased rates on grain and its products, leaf tobacco, beer, ginger ale and other commodities east of the Mississippi river. October 14 was set for arguments on lumber rates to eastern cities.

IT'S A LARGE ORDER TO WATCH ROOSEVELT

Secretary Garrison Declares in Commenting on Colonel's Recent "Indiscreet" Speech.

Washington, August 27.—Secretary Garrison made public today Major General Wood's reply to the secretary's telegram directing that no repetition be permitted of the incident at the Plattsburg camp precipitated by Colonel Roosevelt's speech.

"Your telegram received and policy laid down will be rigidly adhered to," General Wood telegraphed.

"I have just read Mr. Roosevelt's statement," said Secretary Garrison in a statement today. "I see he blames the whole thing on me. He takes the position that it is notorious that he has the habit of making indiscreet speeches and that it, therefore, was my duty to find out if he intended to go to Plattsburg and if so to head him off and save him from himself. Well, maybe that's so, but it is a rather large order. He is a very active man and I am a very busy one and it's going to be a pretty hard job for me to keep my eye on him all the time. The colonel's attitude about himself reminds me of the story of Maine farmer, who was on his way to the railroad station one morning when he met a friend. 'Where you going?' said the friend. He replied, 'I'm going down to Bangor to get drunk.' And great Lord, how I dread it!"

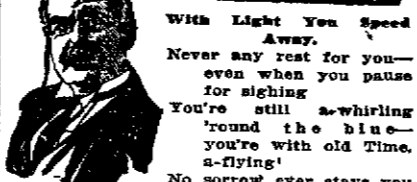

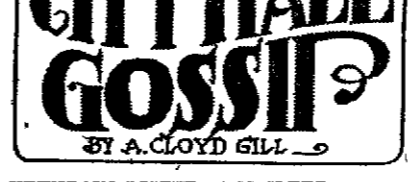

ATLANTA WOMAN'S CLUB COMMITTEE REPORTS ON PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS

The parks and playgrounds committee of the Atlanta Woman's club, by invitation of the general manager of parks, have made a thorough survey of Atlanta's parks and playgrounds and their report is an interesting document which every citizen should read.

The report in full follows: "In 1906 Mr. V. H. Kriegerhager, who might well be called the father of Atlanta playgrounds, brought the attention of the Associated Charities to the necessity of public playgrounds, and a committee of the directors of the Associated Charities, with Mr. Kriegerhager as chairman, opened a subscription for the funds being raised by private subscription.

The playgrounds continued under the direction of the Associated Charities for four years, the city furnishing the modest means after the first year. The number of playgrounds had by that time reached nine, and the funds being raised by private subscription were given control in 1910 of all the playgrounds with an appropriation of \$2,858.59.

The 1915 appropriation amounted to \$3,131.54, just \$284.04 less than that of 1910, while the attendance had increased to 124,142.

On account of the large attendance it was now found necessary to employ two more assistants but due to the insufficient appropriation the season had to be shortened somewhat.

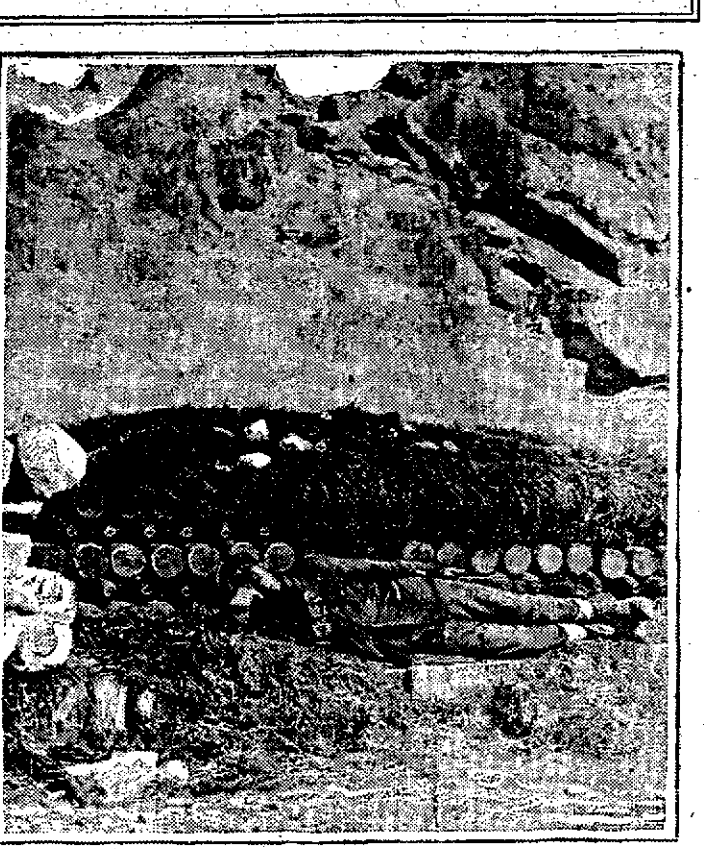
