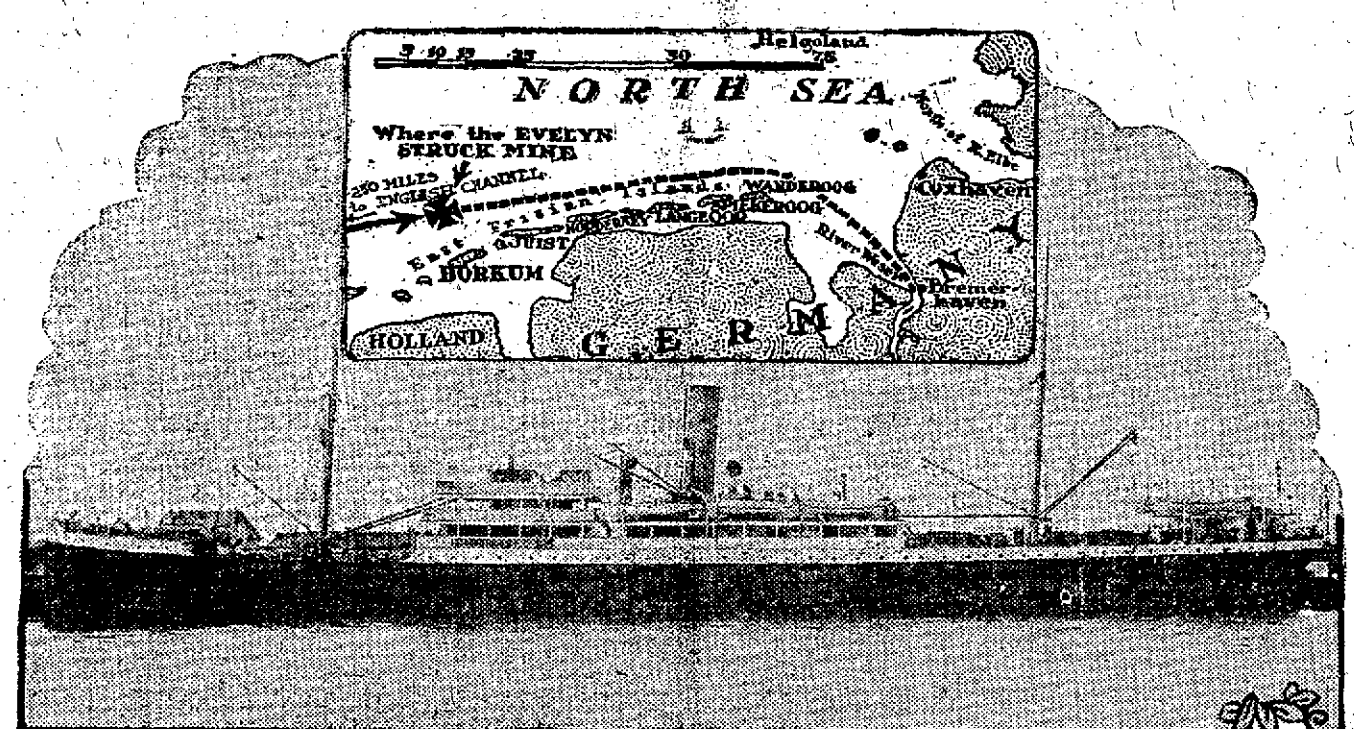

### WOODWARD ASSAILED AT CREMATORY HEARING

#### Mayor's Alleged Connection With Street Car Company Is Investigated.

Mayor James G. Woodward's promise to make things lively at the crematory hearing when he got on the stand, was carried out at the session on Thursday.

When Attorney George Spence, representing the Destructor company, tried to get the mayor to answer questions which appeared to him to be insinuations that he was in some way connected with the Georgia Railway and Power company, the "fur began to fly."

Mr. Spence began to ask the mayor if he was not employed by the company as retiring agent and the answer was snapped back:

"No, and neither you nor any one else can make any such insinuations. I brand them as false."

Mr. Spence next asked if he wasn't employed by the A. R. & A. railroad and wasn't that company under the control of the same men who were at the head of the power company. The reply to this by the mayor was that he had represented the Atlanta Terminal company for thirteen years and that the "how much rent do you collect?" asked the lawyer.

"That's none of your business," snapped back the mayor.

All of this evidence was ruled out by Master Francis W. Jones.

Mayor Woodward then began to get in some hot shots by stating that when officials of the Destructor company called ex-Alderman James B. Everett out of the council chamber just as a vote on the crematory was about to be taken, a "dirty piece of work was done."

He intimated that he could drag in other officials if he wanted to.

The storm seemed to have blown over by the time session adjourned.

#### JUDGE TELLS WHY HE PLACED A BAN ON BAD LANGUAGE

"That Constitution story about my barring bad language in my court is all right and true," stated Recorder Johnson to a reporter Thursday afternoon.

"You see, I want ladies to come down and see how we do business, and how can a lady sit in court and listen to such foul and blasphemous words as some witnesses put in the mouths of defendants. It is really too shocking for a sensitive man. Yes, sir, I have put a ban on it."

Well, sir, that lady just put her face down in her hands and her fingers in her ears and ran. What else could she do? Keep on telling the good people that they can come and see us without being shocked."

#### EXAMINATION FOR AGRICULTURISTS

The United States civil service commission announces that all persons wishing to stand a national examination for agriculturalists, which is to be held March 25, must apply to the secretary of the civil board in several cities, including Atlanta.

Those passing the examination will be eligible for service in the field and the duties of this position will be to conduct investigations on the cost of crop production, to make farm management surveys and to conduct other investigations relating to all phases of farm economics in connection with the general farm management investigations.

No eligibles were secured at the examinations last December. The salaries range from \$2,500 to \$5,000 a year.

The gold received will be placed in a pot and melted into one piece and sold for its actual value, the proceeds being sent to Germany.

#### Robber Kills Cashier.

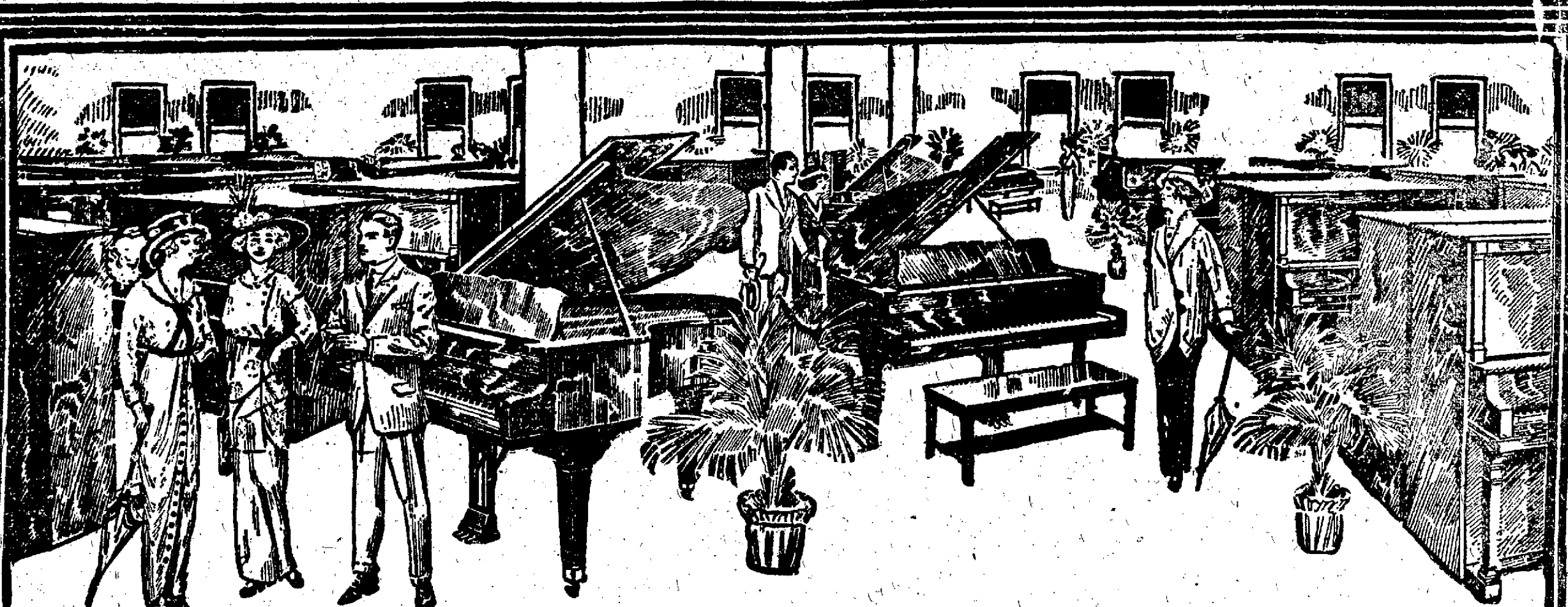
Sterling, Colo., February 25.—John Brunke, assistant cashier of the Farm-

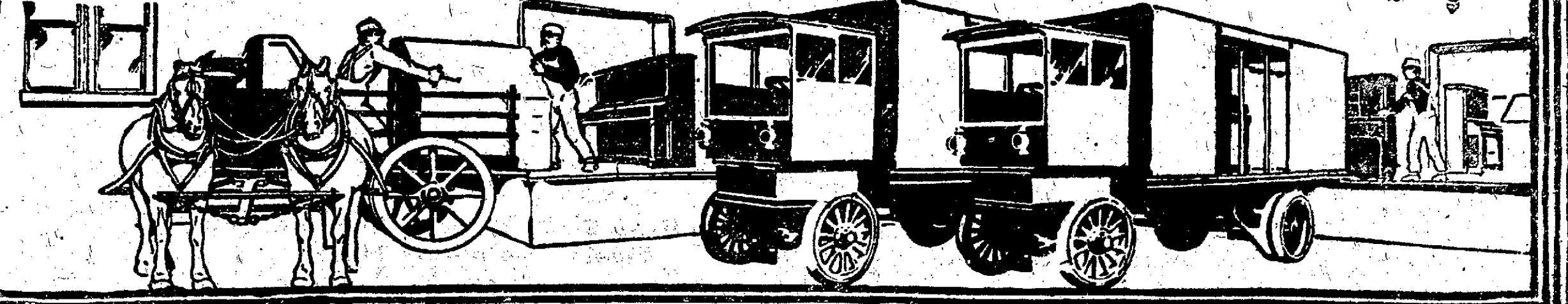

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WHEAT AND WHEAT PRODUCTS DECLINED ADVANCED BY CORN ON EMBARGO TALK

Prices Early in Session Declined, But Rally Occurred Later on and the Market Closed Steady and Higher.

New York, February 25.—After a comparatively slightly declining cotton market and closed steady at a net advance of 4 to 7 points.

Reports that the rate had been temporarily suspended, pending the adjustment of a new and higher schedule for the early part of the year, seemed to have scattered selling during the early trading.

Local traders appeared to find little to indicate that the expected wheat movement would cause any material check in the export movement.

Active months of wheat are 26 points above the level of yesterday on October contracts. Realization of support was 2 or 3 points in the later trading.

There were rumors that a little cotton owned by exporters in the south had been offered for resale, but there was little or no southern selling.

At the best of the day, the early trading today the cotton market showed a decided strengthening.

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STOCKS RECOVERED SOME OF LOSSES

Gains Were Scored in Several Issues, While Others Touched New Low Minimum—Bonds Firm.

New York, February 25.—Further recovery from recent price depressions was made in the stock market, the improvement embracing all parts of the list, with the exception of a few issues whose recovery was the result of unusual conditions.

More stability was manifested by all the markets for foreign exchange, that situation being maintained by circuitous means.
