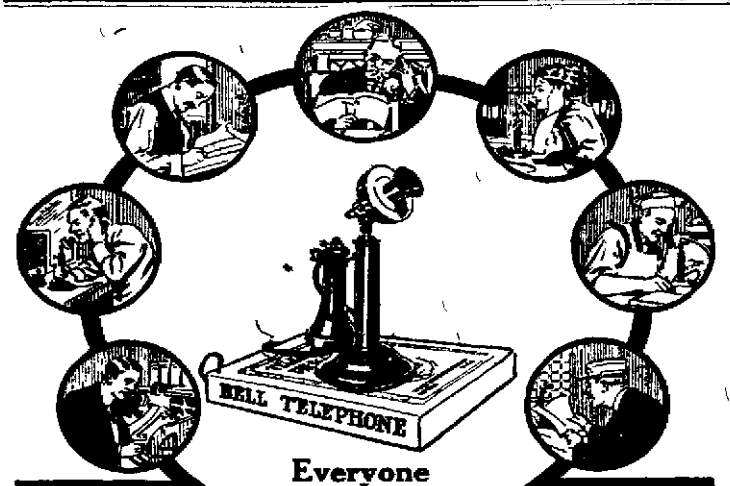

RUSSIANS RETIRE FROM VISTULA. Berlin, June 30—(Via London)—The Russians have begun a retreat from the Vistula river and the district of Zamosc, southeast of Lublin.

The text of the statement follows: "Western theater. The enemy operations of great importance yesterday in the neighborhood of Arras.

"In the Meuse Hills west of Les Eparges the enemy has been attempting since the evening of June 26 to recapture the positions we had taken.

"Eastern theater. There is nothing to report. Southern theater. Our attacks on the Gnila Lipa are progressing.

"East and northeast of Lemberg the situation is unchanged. Between the Bug and the Vistula rivers the German and Austro-Hungarian troops have reached the districts of Bels, Romanow and Zamosc.

"An enemy aeroplane was forced to descend behind our lines. The occupants of the machine were made prisoners.

FRESH EFFORTS MADE BY RUSSIA. Petrograd, June 30—(Via London)—An imperial rescript issued today by Emperor Nicholas in connection with the formation of the Russian board of military supplies, expresses unshakable assurance in the brilliant future of the Russian people.

"A prolonged war calls ever for fresh efforts, but surmounting the growing difficulties and meeting the standards inevitable in war let us strengthen our hearts, resolved to carry on the struggle with the help of God to a complete triumph of Russian arms.

"The enemy must be crushed for without that peace is impossible. With firm faith in the inexhaustible strength of Russia I expect the government and public institutions of Russian industry and all the faithful sons of the fatherland, with the sanction of ideas or classes, will work in harmony to satisfy the needs of our valiant army.

"This is the only and henceforth the national problem to which must be directed all thoughts of united Russia, invincible in her unity."

THE PHILADELPHIA LEDGER, of June 23d, asked: “The saloons in Atlanta were closed in anticipation of trouble. Let us see—isn't Georgia a state with a prohibition law?”

These open sneers at lawlessness in the capital of Georgia should be stopped. We appeal to Mayor Woodward, Council, the Police Department and the press of our city—

Let the world know— Men, here, may not substitute whims and wishes for law and order.

Speaking for forty-seven ministers and a mass meeting of fifteen hundred men and pointing to the petition signed by more than seventeen hundred citizens petitioning the Mayor and Council to refuse to license clubs and saloons, we beg MAYOR WOODWARD to veto the licenses of the Capital City, the Turn Verein, the Transportation, the University and the Standard Clubs.

EACH has filed in the office of the Internal Revenue Collector its application, under oath, specifying its PLACE OF BUSINESS and its purpose TO DO THE BUSINESS OF A RETAIL LIQUOR DEALER.

Code Section 426 says: “It shall not be lawful for any person to sell or barter, or keep on hand AT THEIR PLACE OF BUSINESS any liquor, bitters or other drink, which, if drunk to excess, will produce intoxication.”

Code Section 932, concerning locker clubs, says: “Nothing in this section shall be construed to license or permit the keeping of any intoxicating liquors in any place now prohibited by law.”

THE SUPREME COURT, commenting on the locker club tax imposed by Section 932, said: “The tax imposed is not an occupation or BUSINESS TAX—and is NOT A LICENSE for the sale of or for the keeping on hand of intoxicating liquors in any place prohibited by law.”

Yet, consider— THE CAPITAL CITY CLUB, for example, has obtained from the United States a license to do THE BUSINESS of a retail liquor dealer.

New York, June 30.—The cotton market was quiet today with fluctuations in the way of evening-up accounts for the government crop report expected tomorrow. Early prices were not fully maintained, but prices closed steady at a net gain of from 2 to 4 points.

The cables were relatively steady and the market opened at an advance of 1/4 point to 1/2 point on the active months selling about 5 points net higher during the early trading on covering and short fresh buying which was doubtless encouraged by the more bullish view of the crop's condition.

Private forecasts of the government reports tomorrow were bullish, but they did not affect prices to any extent. The average of guesses on condition of the crop for the week of the normal or a loss of half a point from last month's figures, while expectations regarding the acreage figures were for a reduction of from 12 to 15 per cent.
