

BOMB SHATTERS RECEPTION ROOM IN U. S. CAPITOL, BUT NO ONE IS HURT

Tremendous Explosion Occurs Shortly Before Midnight in Place Where Public Is Received on Senate Side of Building.

OPINION IS EXPRESSED THAT THE EXPLOSIVE WAS PLACED BY CRANK

Doors of Capitol Closed and No One Allowed to Enter While Investigation Is Under Way—Explosion Is Heard for Several Blocks and Caused a Panic.

Washington, July 2.—A tremendous explosion, believed to have been caused by some kind of bomb or internal machine, wrecked the public reception room on the east side of the capitol building shortly before midnight tonight. No one was injured.

Called for Explosive Expert. Superintendent Wood, of the capitol building, summoned by panic-stricken watchmen, made a hurried investigation and then telephoned for an expert on explosives.

Until the expert has made his report no official statement concerning the incident will be made public. Officials believe that the explosive was placed by a crank who desired to create a sensation.

After the first rumors of a bomb, some of the investigators concluded that the blast had been caused by spontaneous combustion in a gas pipe.

While some officials thought the explosion was the work of an irresponsible crank, with no other end in view than a sensation, others seriously suggested that it might have been perpetrated by some one desiring to demonstrate his disapproval of some of the policies of the American government.

GEN. PORFIRIO DIAZ CALLED BY DEATH

Master of Mexico for 35 Years—Diaz Was Overthrown by Madero and Took Refuge in Paris.

Paris, July 2.—General Porfirio Diaz, former president of Mexico, died here early tonight.

General Diaz began to fall rapidly about three weeks ago, and while his death was not unexpected, owing to his advanced age and recent failing health, the crisis came suddenly this afternoon.

Colonel Diaz, in announcing the death of his father, said that he was unable to state the nature of the malady, but expressed the opinion that a complication of diseases, due to advanced age, was the cause.

Two tragic circumstances marked the death of the exiled ruler. Owing to the troubled state in Mexico it has been judged impossible to send the body home with all that ceremony which would have befitted one of the figures of Mexican history.

Not less tragic, perhaps, is the fact that not one of those whom General Diaz raised up as his assistants in governing Mexico and who prospered and grew rich in the shadow of his greatness were with him when he died.

CARE TO BE TAKEN OF SOUTH'S COTTON

Federal Reserve Board Preparing to Handle the Crop Next Fall—Harding Is Looking Into Conditions.

Washington, July 2.—The federal reserve board has decided to take every possible precaution to prevent a recurrence next fall of conditions such as confronted the south last year as a result of the unusually large cotton crop and the shutting out of a large part of the European market.

In carrying out its plan the board has appointed a committee with W. P. G. Harding as chairman to examine into conditions and determine the best way in which the coming crop may be taken care of.

Mr. Harding's letter follows: "The possibility of a congestion of stocks of cotton this fall due to abnormal conditions in our domestic trade, desires full information regarding facilities in your district for warehousing and handling the cotton which is to be exported.

By co-ordinating the four high schools—the Boys' high, under Professor Dykes; the Tech high, under Professor Culver; the Girls' high, under Miss Muse, and the consolidated commercial high for boys and girls, under Mrs. Wise, we will have a more plastic system which is certain to work for a more efficient system."

OUTBREAK OF FEUD FEARED AT PROBE OF RIVER MURDER

Lawyer Engaged by Relatives of Slain Men to Investigate Crime Warned by Anonymous Letter.

INQUEST PREVENTED BY FLOOD ON RIVER

Lawyer Walter McKinney Seeks Protection of Judge Gilbert—Inquest Is Postponed Until Monday.

Blanton's Ferry, Ala., via West Point, Ga., July 2.—(Special.)—The intensity of the situation developed along the Georgia-Alabama frontier by the triple tragedy of Epps and Max Melton and Johnny Leake is, perhaps, more adequately explained by the appeal to be made by Walter McKinney, attorney, engaged by citizens, and families of the slain men to investigate the mysterious murder, to Judge P. C. Gilbert, of the Chattahoochee circuit, of Columbus, to provide means of protection against and prevention of feud uprisings.

A new and equally mystifying angle presented itself tonight when J. E. Johnson, mayor of West Point, stated to The Constitution correspondent that he had talked with residents of Mountain View and Fortson—two way-side communities along the Columbus route taken by the autists Sunday—and that witnesses are available who will testify that the Hargett brothers and Johnny Lands, in the latter's car, reached Fortson Sunday afternoon with the Melton boys on the return trip from Columbus.

Mr. Johnson, who is a native of Harris county, in which live the Hargett brothers, Lands and Teal family, stated that he had also talked with one of the Hargett brothers since the discovery of the body. He asserted that witnesses along the roadway had told him that the Epps brothers and Leake had voluntarily departed from the machine near Fortson, and that Lands and the Hargetts continued in the car toward West Point without the three slain men.

Anonymous Warning Sent. McKinney stated tonight that he received an anonymous letter Thursday warning him to stay away from Blanton's Ferry, and not to attempt any further participation in the inquest.

The turbulence of the river, which destroyed the ferry and made navigation extremely perilous, forestalled possible trouble between the two clans this morning when they would have met had the inquest been held.

Transport, Which Was Loaded With Turkish Soldiers, Was Sent to the Bottom in the Sea of Marmora.

GERMAN WARSHIPS LOSE TO RUSSIAN SQUADRON

In Battle Off the East Coast of the Island of Gothland the German Ships Were Roughly Handled—Two Sent to the Bottom and Others Badly Damaged.

RUSSIANS WIN NAVAL BATTLE. London, July 2.—(Special.)—Dispatches from Stockholm and Copenhagen give meager reports of a naval engagement in the Baltic sea off the east coast of the Island of Gothland.

Another report of the action states that the German mine layer Albatross was ordered to four Russian cruisers and ran aground to escape capture.

It is stated that a German torpedo boat was sunk at Katthammervik, on the east coast of Gothland, with many wounded.

Copenhagen, July 2.—(Via London, July 2, 3:15 a. m.)—The Politiken's Petrograd correspondent states that it is reported that not only was a German torpedo boat sunk at Windau, but that a cruiser of the Magdeburg type also was lost.

The battleship Wittelsbach is of 11,200 tons displacement, of 20,700 horsepower, and carries 12 12-inch guns. She was placed in service in 1902.

TEUTONS HAMMER AT THE RUSSIANS AS THEY RETREAT

Austro-Germans Continue Their Fierce Drive in Galicia and in Poland, and the End Is Not in Sight.

GERMANS ALSO THRUST ON THE WESTERN FRONT

They Are Striking at the French Lines at Several Points—Paris, However, Claims the Attacks Have Been Repulsed.

London, July 2.—The sudden resumption of heavy artillery fire by the Germans in France is a marked feature of the fighting on the western front, while the Austro-German advance in Galicia and Poland is unchecked and the Teutons have shown no disposition to diminish the intensity of their eastern offensive.

The Polish fortress of Zamosc has been captured and Berlin claims advances in other sectors of strategic importance in the east. For weeks it has been the same story in this theater—an Austro-German rush, a Russian retreat—and the end is not in sight.

HEIGHTS TAKEN BY TEUTONS. The Austro-German forces have renewed the Russian positions at Krausnik, in southern Russian Poland, according to Berlin.

BRITONS AWAKE TO SITUATION. There are manifold indications throughout the United Kingdom that the people only now, after nearly a year, fully sense the seriousness of the danger.

RUSSIANS DRIVEN FROM POSITIONS. Vienna, July 2.—(Via London.)—General von Linsingen's army has driven the Russians from strong positions in the Carpathians.

driven the Russians from their strong positions along the Galla Lipa southward from Firilow. The enemy is retreating eastward and is pursued along the whole front. The enemy has suffered heavy losses, 7,065 men and eighteen machine guns being captured.

"Northward the fighting continues. On the Dnieper nothing of importance has occurred. In Russian Poland, on the Vistula and the Bug, we are combating a strong Russian force and also on the For and Brok and Wyznie sectors. Our armies are attacking every where."

"Westward from the Vistula river we attacked hostile positions north of Tarnobrzeg. The enemy is retreating, progressing within storming distance of other parts of the front and at night entered Russian positions, the enemy fleeing. Pursuing the Russians, we captured the village of Wysznie. The Russians were also repulsed from positions southeast of Sienna, where we captured 300 men."

"In the Italian theater, the Italians attacked on the plateau Debedeo repeatedly. They prepared by heavy guns for several hours, they launched infantry attacks between Sarcausina and Sarnigiano, which we repulsed with heavy loss. Fighting at the bridgehead in the Gorz region and at Kryn were repulsed, our troops maintaining their positions. Artillery fighting continues."

RUSSIANS REPORT

HARD FIGHTING

Petrograd, July 2.—(Via London, July 3, 1:33 a. m.)—The following official war office statement was given out this afternoon:

"On June 30th north of Przasnysz and the following night in the Shavil and the Racozin regions we repulsed local German attacks. On the left bank of the Vistula the enemy on Thursday delivered heavy attacks on the front Sienna-Jozefow. In the direction of Lublin the enemy is in contact with us along the Rivers Wyzniec and For. Between the Vepz and Bug rivers the enemy continues to progress towards the north and northeast."

"In the region north of Zamosec on Thursday there was a stubborn rear guard fighting. A regiment of Prussian guards, which had seized the village of Jozefow, was dislodged by our counter attacks."

"On the Sokal-Halicz front the enemy on Wednesday and all of Thursday morning delivered numerous attacks, most of which were repulsed, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy."

"During our counter attacks we took over 4,000 prisoners and captured several machine guns. Nevertheless, south of Rohatyn important enemy forces succeeded Thursday evening in establishing themselves on the left bank of the Zlita Lipa river."

"There is no change on the Dniester river."

TEUTON FORCES STILL ADVANCE

Berlin, July 2.—(Via London)—The German forces have reached the Russian positions at Kranick, in the southern district of Russian Poland, according to the official statement issued today by the German army headquarters. The statement also says that the Russian forces in the region west of Zamosec have been driven back.

The statement follows:

"Western theater: "A night attack on our positions west of Zamosec was beaten off. "In the western portion of the Argonne a part of the Army under the command of the German army headquarters, northwest of La Four de Paris was advanced by storm over a front five kilometers (3 miles) long and from 200 to 300 meters wide. This was carried out by the Wurtembergian troops. "Twenty-five officers and 1,710 men were made prisoners. Eighteen machine guns, 40 mine throwers and one revolver cannon were captured. The French losses were important."

"In the Vosges on Hugenfirst we took an enemy work. Attempts by the enemy to capture a foothold in our works. Through a counter-attack we recaptured, this morning, all our positions, which the Germans are continuing to shell violently."

"In the Dardanelles after the successes gained by the British troops on July 1st, the Turks attempted violent counter-attacks. They were repulsed with heavy losses."

"On June 30 we carried a Turkish reduction to the form of a quadrilateral, including six successive lines of trenches. The ground is covered with dead Turkish soldiers. We have not been counter-attacked."

FIVE VESSELS ARE SUNK BY GERMAN SUBMARINES

British Steamers Caucasian, Inglemoor and Welbury Among the Victims.

London, July 2.—Three British steamers, the Caucasian, Inglemoor and Welbury, the bark Sardonie and the schooner L. C. Tower were reported today to have been sunk by German submarines in the vicinity of the Sillly Islands and off South Ireland.

The Caucasian met her fate southwest of Lizard Head, on the coast of Cornwall, on Thursday morning. While engaged in picking up her crew the Inglemoor fell a victim to the same submarine.

Steamer Tried to Escape.

The Caucasian, when the submarine opened fire, was given full steam in an endeavor to escape. Not until the steamer was struck by several shots did her captain surrender. The crew then took to the boats. The submarine hauled alongside and fired eight shells into the vessel. A dog belonging to the captain of the Caucasian jumped overboard and the captain, who was on the deck, was hit on the rough sea and required his pet.

A few hours later the Inglemoor appeared on the scene and started picking up the Caucasian's boats. The Inglemoor had taken the occupants of the small boats on board when the submarine emerged and opened fire on the Inglemoor. The Inglemoor's crew took to the boats and the submarine then torpedoed and sank the Inglemoor, subsequently firing to the Caucasian, which was still floating, and sending her to the bottom.

The crew of the Inglemoor and a part of the crew of the Caucasian were landed at Penzance, but one of the Caucasian's boats, with nineteen men aboard, was being rowed toward France when last sighted.

The Welbury Sugar-Laden.

The commander of the submarine was delighted on learning that the Inglemoor had taken the cargo of sugar. After the ship left Cuba it was discovered that some one had put a message in the cargo hold in the words:

"I have a cargo of sugar for England, but you will never get there."

The Inglemoor and Caucasian were sunk by the "U-39." This was the submarine which sank the Lusitania. The skipper of the L. C. Tower reports that the submarine, after sinking the Inglemoor, subsequently fired on the dumpy canvas funnel, two masts and false bows of the vessel. These contrivances gave her the appearance of being a deeply-laden steamer with smoke issuing from her funnels.

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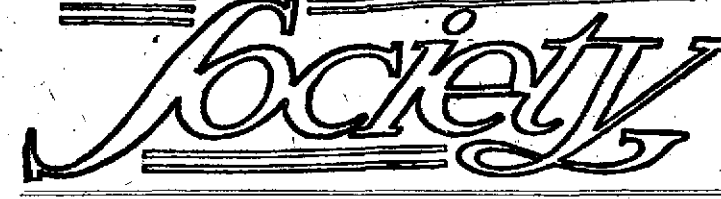

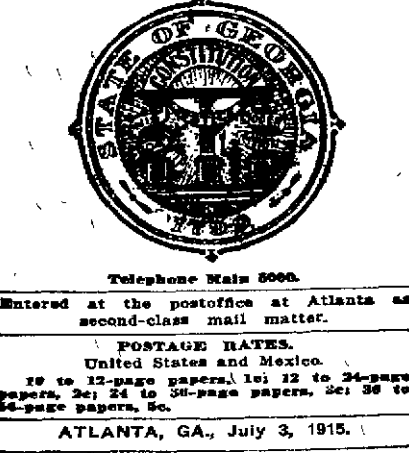

TRUTH WILL END LAW-BREAKING LOCKER-CLUBS

"We can do nothing against the truth, but for the truth." II Cor. 13-8

THE SUPREME COURT has declared—The locker club is not a business, and the sale of liquor in a club is a violation of law.

COUNCIL has said—Those desiring to operate a locker club "shall file a petition with the MAYOR AND COUNCIL asking for license therefor—

"NO LICENSE or permit shall be granted—unless it appears that same is a bona fide social or locker club and not instituted or operated—for the purpose of providing a place wherein intoxicating liquors, wine, beer, etc., may be furnished under the form of a club—

"NO LICENSE—shall be issued to any club, unless it appears that same is operated, maintained, or proposed to be operated as a bona fide social or locker club, having a room or place—at which—LOCKERS are maintained for the BONA FIDE use of MEMBERS ONLY—and NOT AS A CLOAK OR SUBTERFUGE for the sale of intoxicants; and having a membership whose dues or entrance fees are sufficient to provide for the maintenance of such organization and the expenses thereof."

Mayor and Council, together, alone have authority to license a locker club.

Monday, Council refused to license nine clubs and deferred action on others.

Notwithstanding WITHOUT regard for Council or law, CHAIRMAN EDWIN JOHNSON, according to paper reports, has authorized all locker clubs to continue to do business.

The same day, Thursday, the attorney for the Central Club, Mr. James Warren, said to Mr. Johnson's committee—

"None of the clubs nor saloons are operating in accordance with the law."

MAYOR WOODWARD, who has since vetoed the only five licenses granted by Council, said to the committee—

"If the police will properly enforce the state laws and make the locker clubs obey them, every locker club will have to go out of business."

THAT SAME DAY, if not the same hour, Recorder Johnson, in firing the manager of the Greek club and the bartender thereof, "brought out the information that FORTY CENTS is the standard PRICE in Atlanta locker clubs for half a pint of WHISKY."

Yet, papers say the Police Committee will again recommend to Council that all locker clubs be licensed, with the addition of the T. M. A. CLUB.

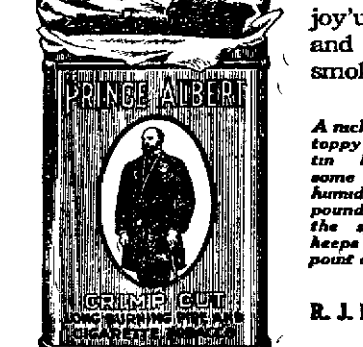

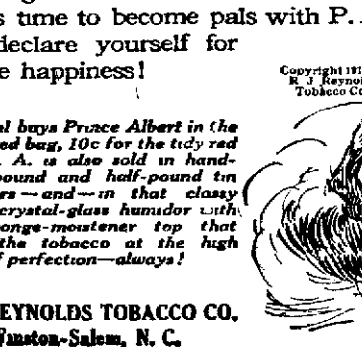
