"If I Live Out My Term I Will Free Stripling and Many Others, Who Have Been Sufficiently Punished," He Says.

EVERYTHING ELSE FADES INTO BACKGROUND COMPARED WITH MY EXPERIENCE IN TUBERCULAR WARD, STATES GOVERNOR HARRIS.

The people of Georgia Saturday got an intimate view of their chief executive, Governor Nathan Harris, as a result of his expressed opinion at the state prison farm and reformatory.

Moved by the scenes at the prison farm, Governor Harris announced last night on his return to Atlanta that he would send a special message to the general assembly, probably next Friday, when he will recommend radical reforms, and will probably ask for an appropriation of at least \$50,000 for needed improvements.

WORSER THAN BEING DEAD

"Poor fellows! Some of them have been at the farm twenty-five or thirty years; their former friends and associates have forgotten them. It is worse than being dead," said the governor.

KEPT CLEAN

"The tubercular wards were spotlessly clean and well appointed; in fact they were in such good condition that I remarked that it appeared they had been put in order because the governor was paying a visit."

Charges a "Joke," Declare Probers Of Judge Russell

NAREW RIVER CROSSED BY THE GERMAN FORCES

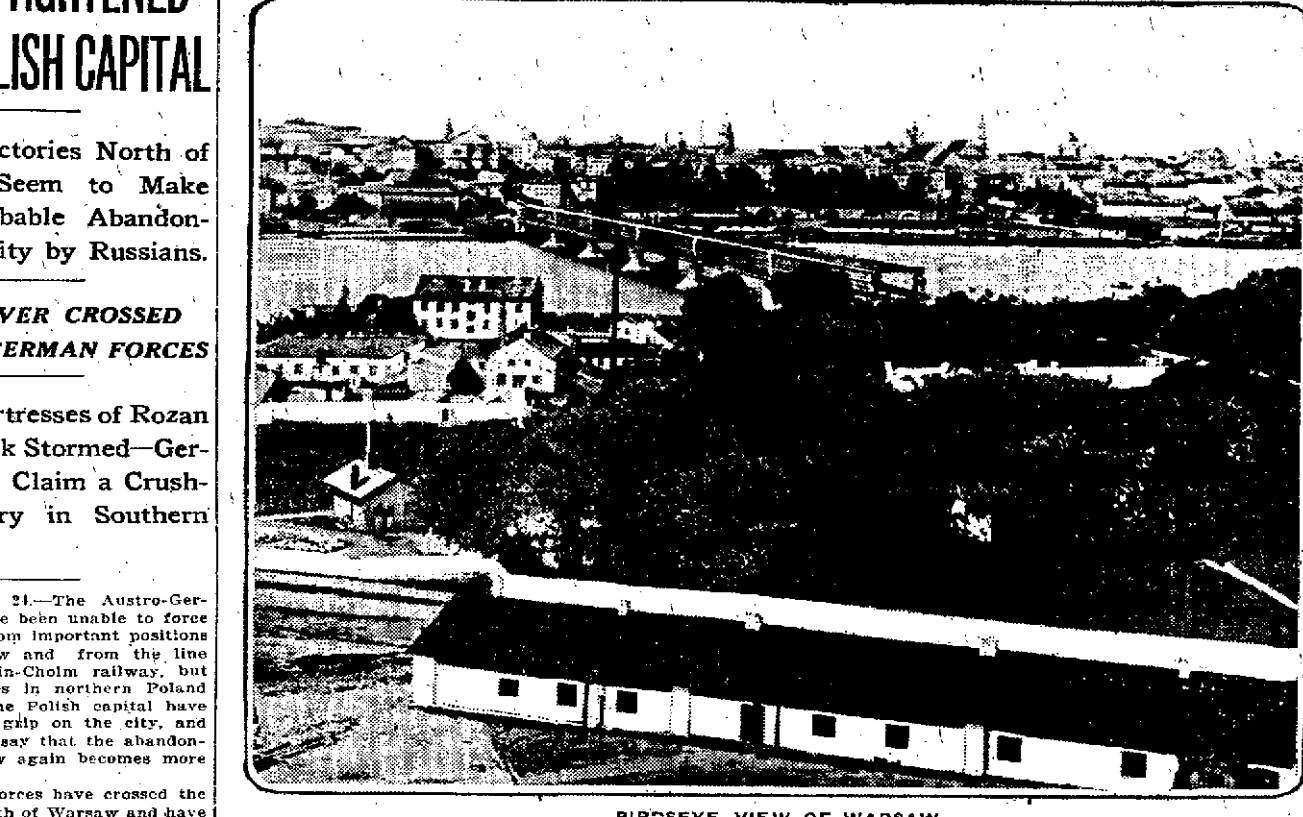
And the Fortresses of Rozan and Pultusk Stormed—Germans Also Claim a Crushing Victory in Southern Courland.

London, July 24.—The Austro-German armies have been unable to force the Russians from important positions west of Warsaw and from the line along the Lublin-Grodno railway, but German victories in northern Poland and north of the Polish capital have tightened their grip on the city, and military critics say that the abandonment of Warsaw again becomes more probable.

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CHICAGO MOURNING FOR 1,000 DROWNED WHEN PICNIC BOAT "TURNED TURTLE"

More Than 700 Corpses Have Been Taken From the River and From the Hull of Capsized Steamer Eastland.

UNDER SEARCHLIGHTS MEN WORK IN THE HULL TO REMOVE THE BODIES

Several Persons Found Alive After Ship Had Lain at River Bottom for Hours. Baby Girl Is Found by the Divers—Cause of Accident Not Yet Determined—The Eastland's Design Said to Have Been Faulty.

Chicago, July 24.—A thousand persons lost their lives in the Chicago river today by the capsizing of the excursion steamer Eastland while warping from its wharf with more than 2,400 employees of the Western Electric company and their relatives and friends on board, bound for a pleasure trip across Lake Michigan.

After working ceaselessly all day and far into the night, the bodies of 842 victims of the catastrophe, most of them women and children, were collected in temporary morgues and taken to the Second regiment armory. When these bodies had been tagged, Coroner Hoffman, taking into consideration estimates of bodies thought to be in the hold of the steamer, lying on its side in the river, and in the stream itself, said he had hopes that the total dead would not exceed 1,000.

SHIP CAPSIZED IN FIVE MINUTES

The Eastland, said by marine architects to have been top-heavy and ballasted in an uncertain manner, turned over inside of five minutes after it began to list, pouring its gala passengers into the river, or imprisoning them in its submerged hull.

PALL OF SORROW OVER WEST SIDE

A pall of sorrow hung tonight over the entire West Side of Chicago, where the majority of the victims lived.

MANY CORPSES STILL IN HULK. During the day more than 700 bodies were taken from the river and from the hull of the overturned steamer, the sides of which were cut open to admit divers.

SHIP LURCHES TO HER DOOM. Instead, the heavily laden ship wavered sidewise, leaning first towards the river bank. The lurch was so startling that many passengers joined the large concourse already on the river side of the decks.

TRAGEDY CAUSES CONSTERNATION. The whole city was in consternation over the catastrophe. Word of the accident spread rapidly and in a few minutes thousands already at or near the wharf other thousands added themselves.

COMPOSED AS THEY PASSED BETWEEN rows of corpses, looking for missing children of the ship.

AS GRAND JURY TO INVESTIGATE. Yet amidst all the horror and heart-sore, officers of various departments attended to pressing duties of disposing of the bodies of the missing.

Under the glare of searchlights to-night scores of men worked in the hull of the vessel to remove the bodies. The steamer lay on the bottom of the river one side protruding like a monument to the hundreds it had drowned as it turned over.

Then there was a plunge with a sigh of air escaping from the hull mingled with crying of children and shrieks of women and the ship was on the bottom of the river, casting hundreds of living creatures to the water.

HUNDREDS CAME TO THE SURFACE. Many sank, entangled with clothing and bundles and did not rise, but hundreds came to the surface, seized floating chairs and other objects.

Those in charge of the various works of clearing up the toll of casualties were making the responsibility for the capsizing of the boat said tonight the endeavor would necessarily be slow because of the large number of persons on board.

MAJOR WOOD. Major William Wood, in San Francisco and Chief of Police of San Francisco, was also out of town but Acting Mayor Moorhead sent out a request that the city display signs of mourning.

AS CRANK OF THE LAKES. The Eastland was built by the Fort Harrison shipyard and on its trial run in 1903 failed to come up to specifications, according to Wood, who was then one of the judges to pass on its performance.

Grabbed Girl by Her Hair And Saved Her From Death

Chicago, July 24.—Charles Williams, representative for a New York concern, stripped to his underclothes and plunged into the river. He saved a man who was choking to death.

The officers of the boat pushed back the crowds which were around the gang plank, in order to pull it in. I think this is what caused the boat to roll and a few moments later it was out in the middle of the river on its side.

"I saw dozens of people drown around me, but was unable to give assistance. By a good effort I was able to climb on the upper side of the boat and managed to hold on until taken off by rescuers.

RELATIVES OF VICTIMS TO GET INSURANCE. Chicago, July 24.—Relatives of employees of the Western Electric company are provided for under an insurance plan maintained through affiliation with the American Telephone and Telegraph company.

EASTLAND FAULTY IN HER DESIGN. Marine architects asserted that the Eastland was faulty in design, that the top deck had been removed because of the tendency of the bottom of the vessel to protrude like a monument to the hundreds it had drowned as it turned over.

While those on land were disposing of the dead, injured and rescued, divers in the heart of the river sought for survivors. In the first few days only a few bodies were recovered.

FOUND ALIVE. One thrill passed through the crowd as word came from the steamer that a girl baby had been found alive among the hundreds of dead.

EASTLAND WAS KNOWN AS CRANK OF THE LAKES

Chicago, July 24.—The Eastland was the crank of the lakes. W. J. Wood, naval architect, who was called by the owners in 1903 to correct faults in the boat, declared today.

The Eastland used water ballast, so that it could pump out some on entering shallow lake harbors, so some investigators are working on a theory that the ballast tanks were not filled and the rushing of passengers to one side of the decks caused it to roll over.

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WOOD'S OPINION. The design of the vessel would not permit its operation as other vessels are operated and it was not built to be taken at all times.

85 BODIES TO THE ROW IN CHICAGO ARMORY

Chicago, July 24.—Bodies, long rows of them, 85 to the row, made the scene at the Second regiment armory showing appalling to the uninitiated, and the sight brought tears.

FOR POWERFUL NAVY AND ADEQUATE ARMY WILSON IS WORKING

Announcement That President Has Called for Reports on National Defense Causes Widespread Comment.

PRESIDENT IS PLANNING FOR PERMANENT POLICY

Indicated in Official Quarters That Plans Are to Be Expedited Because of Possibilities of International Situation.

Washington, July 24.—Announcement from the white house today that President Wilson has directed Secretaries Garrison and Daniels to report to him a program of national defense caused widespread comment.

Several weeks ago the president discussed the question with his cabinet with the result that both departments began preparation of plans to meet any emergency and also to establish a permanent policy for adequate national defense.

The text of the statement given out from the white house follows: "The president has been considering every phase of the matter of national defense and intends immediately on his return to Washington to confer with the secretary of war and the secretary of the navy, his purpose being to formulate a sane, reasonable and practical program of national defense."

For a long time the president has been in conference with members of the general staff shaping plans for presentation to the president.

Mr. Wilson has not indicated whether he will call congress into special session. This depends largely on the developments in the international situation.

Among army and navy officers familiar with the latest developments the belief prevails that a military budget practically double that of last year will be presented at a special session of congress.

AMERICAN BULLETS TO STOP MEXICANS

If They Fight on Border and Fire Into U. S. Territory—General Funston Is Ordered to Use Force.

Washington, July 24.—Orders were issued today with the approval of President Wilson to Major General Funston to repel with force if necessary any firing into American territory during fighting between the Mexican factions in border towns, and a note was dispatched to General Carranza advising him of that fact.

Soon afterward advices from Vera Cruz to the Carranza headquarters here said the general had instructed General Calles, his commander before Nogales, not to attack the Villa forces there, and gave assurances that the Carranza forces would not occupy Naco, would withdraw, leaving a civil administration in charge.

What threatened a new complication in the Mexican situation apparently was the dispatch to Carranza, who is determined to take drastic action if the Mexicans force the fighting. The specific method of repelling any possible attack was not mentioned in the note to Carranza, but the inference was that Carranza would be expected to take the situation construed as an attack on American citizens.

Specific instructions to General Funston were directed to resist border attacks immediately without referring the question further to Washington.

General Carranza apparently gave immediate heed to the warning. A dispatch received from him by his agency here late today stated he had instructed his troops to discontinue their march on Nogales.

The state department has had the border situation under consideration for several days. The Villa and Carranza agencies here have each held the other responsible for the violation of the agreement to neutralize border towns.

General Carranza is reported to be in Torreon, with no communication south of Zacatecas.

GERMANY FIXES PRICES FOR NECESSARIES OF LIFE

Severe Punishment for Those Who Unduly Increase Prices of Food.

Berlin, July 24.—(By Wireless to Savannah).—The federal council has issued its long expected order regulating prices for necessities of life, especially grain and fodder. The order provides that severe punishment shall be dealt dealers who unduly increase prices or withhold articles of food for the purpose of artificially raising prices.

GERMAN IS ARRESTED FOR EXPLOSION PLOT

Cleveland, Ohio, July 24.—A young German, 25 years old, whose name the authorities refused to divulge, was arrested tonight on a charge of suspicion in connection with an alleged plot to blow up the plants of the American Steel and Wire company, the Peerless Motor Car company and the White company.

DEMANDS OF STRIKERS REFUSED AT BAYONNE

New York, July 24.—Efforts to settle the strike of 2,500 Bayonne oil workers, which has been in progress for a week and the killing of three strikers, failed tonight, when the Standard Oil company of New Jersey notified the men that it would not accede to their demands.

In their demands the strikers expressed their willingness to accept a 15 per cent increase in wages with a 54-hour week or to return to work Monday, leaving the several points in dispute to be decided by a board of arbitration that would later be appointed.

TORPEDO TEARS HOLE IN TURKISH CRUISER

London, July 25.—(1:58 a. m.).—Advices received in Athens from Constantinople state that the Turkish cruiser Midilli, formerly the German cruiser Erebrast, was torpedoed in the Black sea and has returned with a hole six yards long and three yards wide under the water line, according to the Athens correspondent of Reuter's Telegram company.

In Message to Legislature Governor Will Recommend State Farm Improvements

Closeted With the Governor and the Adjutant General, Creen Tells Why He Tried to Kill Frank.

BY NE DUNN. (Special Staff Correspondent.) Milledgeville, Ga., July 24.—(Special) Based upon his personal investigation of the attempt made by William Creen upon the life of Leo M. Frank and the fight Wednesday between two prisoners, Frank and Charlie Miller and his inspection of the condition of the entire state prison farm and reformatory properties Governor Nat Harris upon his return to Atlanta will draft a special message to the general assembly recommending measures that he believes should be taken to remedy conditions at the farm.

Just what the governor's comments or recommendations before the general assembly will be he would not today disclose.

To Urge Improvements. That is one of the things about which I do not desire to talk said Governor Harris in answer to inquiries "I prefer to weigh the matter and let my first comment be to the general assembly itself.

The views of the governor and the prison commission upon things seen to day however were so thoroughly in accord that it is likely that in his message he will recommend all the improvements for which the appropriations committee has urged a special appropriation of \$30,000 as well as other details which the commission has from time to time asked.

Among other things that Governor Harris will recommend in his message to the general assembly will be that convict labor be used as far as possible for the construction of any new buildings that may be built by appropriations made by this assembly. He will also urge that the appropriation be increased.

Governor Harris many talks with old and disabled prisoners led to the general belief that when he returns to his office he will more frequently grant clemency in such cases. There are many such prisoners who are hardly more than wards of the state's charity. The governor explained that his visit to the farm was in such part to investigate the conditions as to investigate the Frank incident.

Commission to Meet.

The prison commission will hold a meeting soon after they get back to Atlanta and so over the general situation seen by them today. R. E. Davidson of the commission, stated that this meeting might probably draft a report touching upon the Frank affair the night between Reid and Miller and general conditions. It is probable that the report will be submitted to the governor for his consultation in drafting his message to the assembly.

No Blame for Staff.

Members of the prison commission declared that they have no reasons to believe that any of the staff at the prison is responsible through any neglect of duty for the fact that Creen secured the knife or for any other circumstances surrounding the affair.

It is simply one of those unfortunate things that just sometimes happen, said one member of the commission. He did not believe the prison commission is responsible in any way for recent events at the farm or for the conditions existing there.

After completing their inspection of the state's property here this afternoon the members of the commission left Milledgeville and were escorted about town by Congressman Carl Vinson of the tenth district. Mayor Miller S. Bell, President M. M. Parks of the Georgia Normal and Industrial Institute and Dr. H. Tignor, secretary of the board of trustees. They then left for Macon by automobile where they will return to Atlanta by train.

Looked in a room at the state prison farm Governor Harris and Adjutant General J. V. Holt. It was in this room that William Creen told why he tried to kill Leo M. Frank Saturday night a week ago. Creen stated that in attacking Frank he was in fact attacking the prison of a man whose presence he believed would result in a mob attack on the prison and the consequent loss of innocent lives.

He had formed this opinion he said by reading newspapers and had alone planned his attack simply because he felt it was his duty.

Creen then stated following his talk with Creen that he did not hold Warden James L. Smith or other of the prison staff responsible. I don't like it he said in referring to conditions.

Creen told his story in the presence of Gov. Harris and Adjutant General J. V. Holt. With the governor asking in connection with the prisoner's words, that he be granted a private audience.

Creen understood for the first time since his attack on Frank was cloistered with the governor in the room adjoining that in which Frank lies wounded. All doors led from the room were bolted.

Creen took by reciting to the governor the history of his own case up to the time of the attack on Frank. He told briefly of the fact that he had attacked the man and was serving a life sentence.

Creen Tells Story.

Why did you do this? asked the governor referring to the attack on Frank.

Creen's story, as repeated by the governor and General Holt, substantially was: "I had heard talk of the danger of Frank being kept here. He was here there was danger of the prison being attacked. I was afraid the guards and the people of the town would shoot at each other and people be killed. So I came to the conclusion that I would kill the people from the dinner to which Frank's presence exposed them. I determined that Frank

He has been a laborer, a government secret service man and in recent years a minister doing missionary work in the Hawaiian Islands. McCarty returned to Georgia recently to visit his sister and made no secret of his identity. He has engaged King & Johnson to defend him at his trial, which will be prosecuted by Colonel George Napier. The killing with which McCarty is charged is said to have been caused by Smith's striking McCarty's mother.

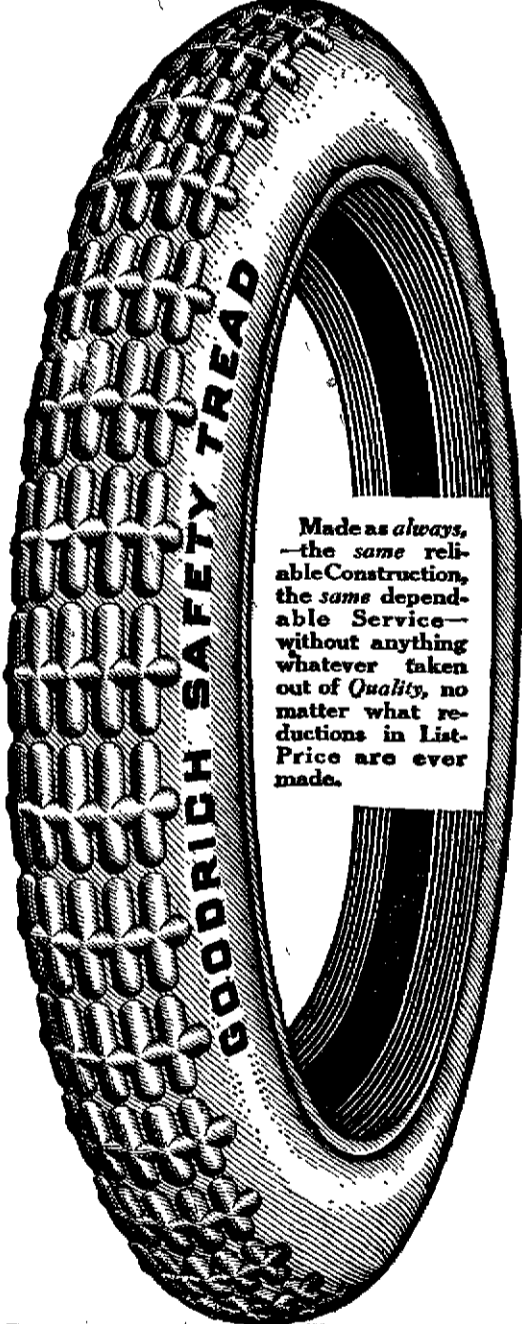

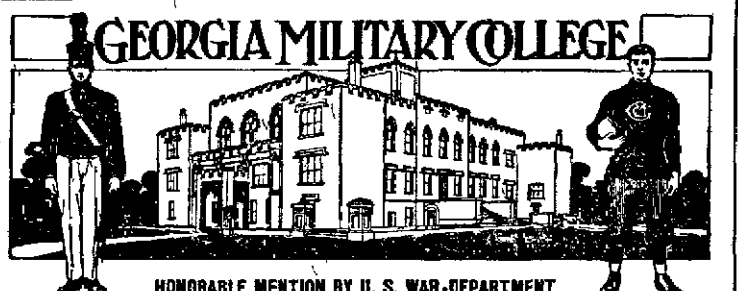

Bears Abandon German Success As an Argument of Depression

Labor Troubles Cause Heavy Liquidation of War Specialty Group—Kaiser's Renewal Submarine Attacks on Ships Bearing Neutrals Creates Anxiety.

New York, July 24.—(Special.)—The stock market was sharply reactionary early in the last week, with heavy selling in war specialties from the first moment of trading Monday morning. This selling was largely a result of the labor troubles which have cropped up in the steel industry, but the cause of selling was the "Orduna" attempt, by which it was argued that the government would not be bound by the terms of the submarine warfare found to be contrary to the ideas of this country as to the rights of neutrals.

The copper market has been easier during the last week, with demand having been in very small amount. It is believed that the liquidation for Europe is over until some new factor enters the market.

The foreign exchange market was a little easier, reflecting the fact that Russia has been unable to make payments either in gold or in goods.

Final estimates of the total value of exports and imports of the United States during the fiscal year to June 30, 1915, are \$3,800,000,000, an increase of about \$435,000,000 of the year before.

Labor troubles in western oil works are causing a marked result of grievances on the part of employees, but there are suspicious circumstances about the matter.

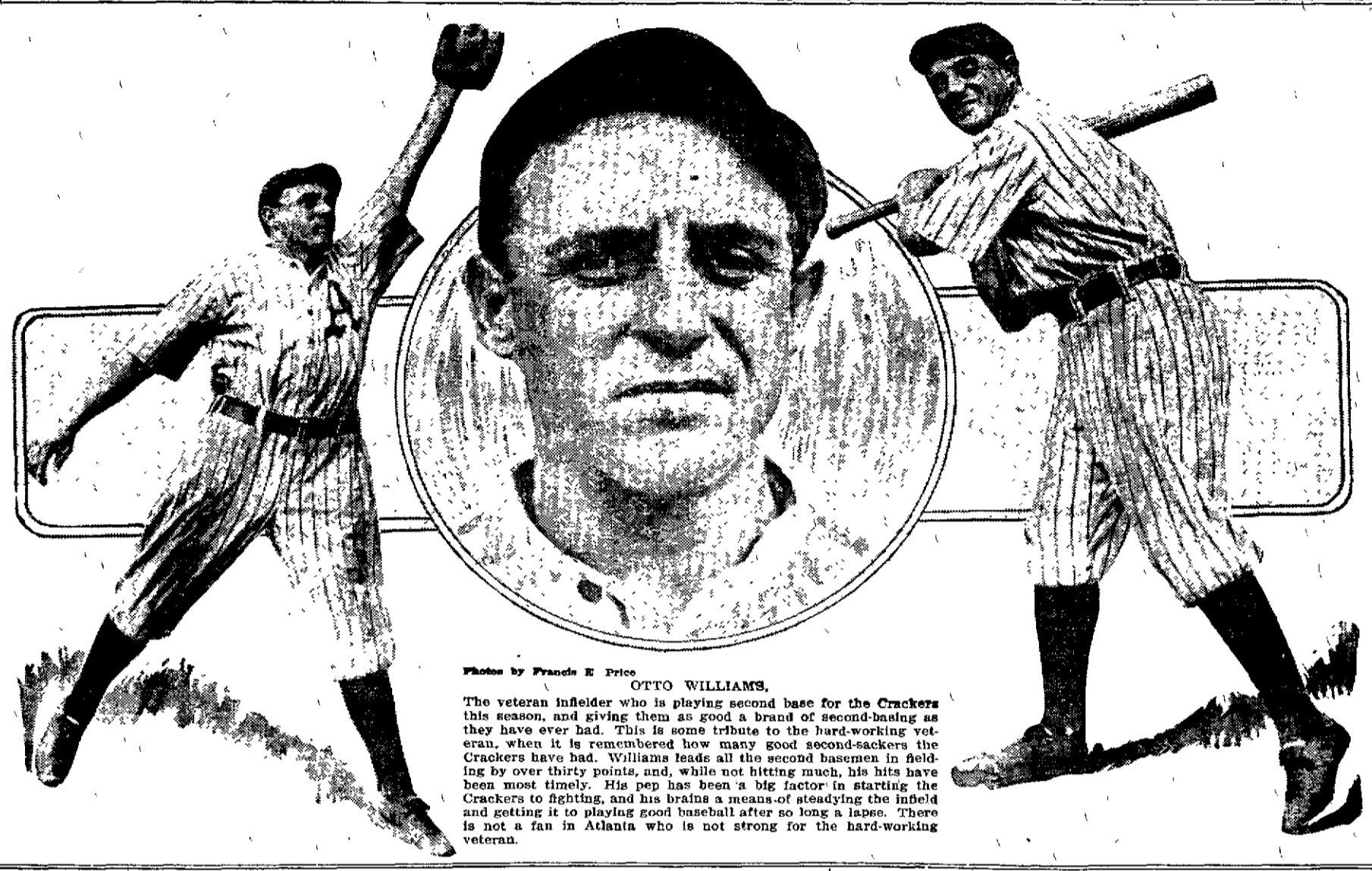

In token of Saxon's enthusiasm over Goodyear tires also the company made each dealer who participated a present of a Goodyear tire.

The test now is ended and the scores are being compiled and compared so that the prizes due by the company for best performances may be awarded. The editors of the home newspapers of the men in the test act as judges upon the arrival of the cars at destination and unofficial reports are to the effect that the Goodyear equipment stood up finely throughout.

Adverse weather conditions were encountered from the beginning. The cars left Detroit in a shower and after a driving rain that made many roads a sea of mud so that the work out for tires was hard and unrelieved wherever pavements were lacking.

Some surprising official statements will shortly be forthcoming on the results of the oil and gas consumption and a number of attractive prizes are to be distributed.

CADILLAC CARS IN LONG JOURNEY OF MILITARY MEN

Thirty-four days after leaving Chicago, and having covered about 2,000 miles of all kinds of roads in good weather and bad, mostly bad, the Northwestern Military and Naval Academy's fleet of eight Cadillac cars arrived in San Francisco, well-combed by the mayor and officials of the Panama-Pacific exposition and given a prominent camping ground inside the exposition.

The military cars, with about 50 cadets and in charge of Colonel R. P. Davidson the commandant and with Lieutenant E. G. Arne-

mann, U. S. A., official observer for the war department, left Chicago June 10. The start was made under favorable auspices, but the column almost immediately ran into rainy weather which continued for nine days. Through all this time the cars ploughed gumbo and camp was made almost every night in the rain. The task of pulling through the gumbo and climbing the steep hills of the west was a simple one for the eight cylinder Cadillacs five of this type being included in the column.

The column included an officers' reconnaissance car equipped with special military rifles, map tables and map making instruments, a dictating machine, six two-wheeled cars, a field kitchen, a hospital car, an armoured car mounting a rapid fire gun, a quartermaster's car with rapid fire gun and the balloon destroyer car which is a veteran of 80,000 miles of road and field work, and the hero of the 1910 Glidden tour.

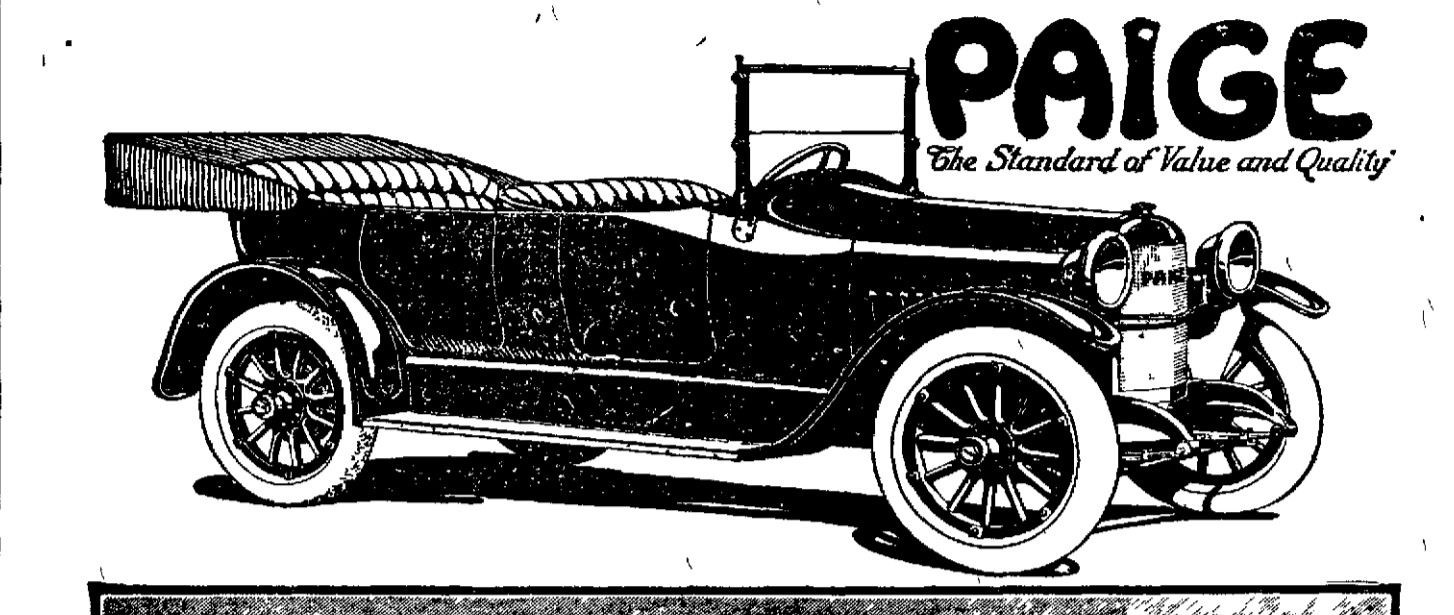
Colonel Davidson, the commandant of the academy, has been building up his motor car corps for a number of years, using Cadillac cars exclusively. Each summer he plans a tour that will demonstrate some new phase of the automobile's usefulness as an adjunct to an army in the field. The journey just successfully completed is the most difficult ever attempted by his corps, and more extended than any ever before undertaken by a number of military cars.
