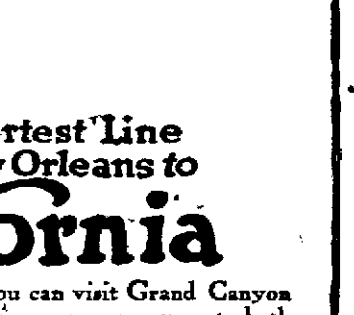
first session of the Pan-American financial conference. GOOD FOR ATLANTA!
It is well for Atlanta that Mayor Wood ward has seen fit to recede from his position of refusal to preside over the city council as the ordinance requires during the election of a city purchasing agent.

The truth of the matter is Mayor Wood ward took the only right way out of an unfortunate predicament of his own making—a situation in which public sympathy had turned to council because of an evident disposition on the part of the executive to heckle the city legislative body upon matters purely of minor importance.

Atlanta is confronted by a crisis in her public school system. A big work must be done to save it and it must be done quickly. Here is a situation where harmony is absolutely necessary to the rapid achievement of substantial result.

Italy's declaration of war against Austria, which has come at last creates about as much of a stir in the world as does a pebble upon the surface of a pond. The world was more than prepared for it, has been for some months in fact the world has suffered somewhat keen disappointment over what has appeared to be useless and unnecessary delay.

Italy's die is cast
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knows the Austrians and Germans are better prepared than it was ever thought they would be to meet the Italian onslaught. A few months ago Italy could have begun the war well within Austrian territory, probably by just such a rushing march as carried Germany into France. Today she will be fortunate to begin it at the Austrian boundary.

The German advantage was won both by speedy decision and prompt action. That is why Germany is fighting today on French territory. In the same manner Italy might have carried the war deep into the enemy's country, perhaps to the gates of the Austrian capital. Now she must pay in men and money for her dilatory policy.

Nevertheless Italy's die is cast and she is in the war game to the finish. She must fight and fight hard. There is no nation engaged on the side of the allies to which a German victory would mean greater disaster.

THE WORLD WILL WATCH WITH EAGER INTEREST the effect of Italian aggressiveness in this continental war but it will watch without that same hope of an early peace which but a few short months ago seemed almost within easy reach.

WILL THERE BE REPUDIATION?
If the European war continues until July 31 a period of one year from its commencement it is stated based upon expenditures to date that it will have cost the participating nations the staggering sum of \$35,702,000,000 or more than thirty five times the entire national debt of the United States.

The British parliament has just been asked for an appropriation of \$5,682,000,000 for the purpose of carrying on the war for another year. The war is said to be costing Great Britain \$10,500,000 a day and most of the other nations involved about the same amount.

Consideration of these stupendous figures naturally brings up the question as to whether there will be repudiation of history in the shape of repudiation of European obligations. If the war goes on for another year both expenditures and property losses will have been doubled possibly increased in even greater proportion.

But war expenses in these days are very different from what they were even a half century ago. Where they were millions then they are hundreds of millions today. Speed and slaughter have brought tremendous added cost. War is carried on upon a credit basis.

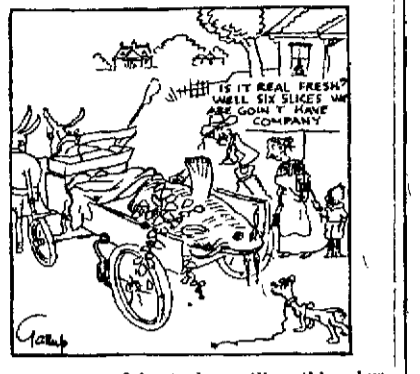
