Already Tense Situation Aggravated by Attack On U. S. Ship Nebraskan

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SINGLE TORPEDO FROM SUBMARINE DESTROYED SHIP

Disaster Occurred While Triumph Was Operating in Support of Australians on Gallipoli Peninsula.

FEW LIVES WERE LOST WHEN SHIP WENT DOWN

Majority of Officers and Crew Were Saved—The Submarine Was Chased by Destroyers, But Managed to Escape.

London, May 26.—The British battleship Triumph has been sunk in the Dardanelles. This official announcement was made tonight.

The disaster to the Triumph is described in a brief statement by the admiralty which says that while operating in support of the Australian and New Zealand forces on the shore of the Gallipoli peninsula yesterday the Triumph was torpedoed by a submarine and sank shortly afterwards.

Most of the officers and men including the captain and commander, are reported to have been saved.

The submarine was chased by destroyers and patrolling small craft until dark.

Probably German Submarine. The official announcement does not say whether the submarine was a Turkish or German but it probably was of the latter nationality as the British legation at Athens recently offered a reward for the sinking of German submarines supposed to be in the Mediterranean.

With the sinking of the Triumph five allied battleships have been accounted for in the Dardanelles by Turkish gunfire mines or torpedoes. Of these losses the British have sustained four—the Triumph, Ocean, Irrepressible and Goliath. One French ship has been sunk—the Bouvet. In addition several other allied battleships have at various times been struck by Turkish shells and forced to retire from the fighting in the waterways.

Triumph Built in 1902. The battleship Triumph was built at Barrow in 1902 for Chile but was purchased by Great Britain in 1903. She was laid down under the name of Lochmow.

Since the present war broke out the Triumph has been in operation in both the eastern and western waters. As flagship of the British Asiatic squadron she participated in the bombardment of the German base of Tsingtau, China, last October and was reported to have been damaged by the snipe fire of the German forts.

In the latter part of April the Triumph bombarded the Turkish trenches on the western end of the Gallipoli peninsula. Afterwards she went into the Dardanelles to shell the trenches from a different angle. Here she came under the fire of a Turkish howitzer battery on the Asiatic shore which dropped sixteen shells around her and three of them sailed on board. Little damage was done by the shells however and only two men were wounded.

The battleship sailed the Turkish battleships before retiring.

Triumph Fined Town of Madison. A few days later while landing operations were proceeding the Triumph with other warships in addition to receiving the landing boats, was fired on by the Dardanelles. The Triumph was credited in the official report with the sinking of the town of Madras during this bombardment.

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REBATE CLAUSE STICKS IN TARIFF

Court Holds Goods Imported in American Ships Are Entitled to 5 Per Cent Reduction—Decision Costly to Government.

Washington, May 26.—The so-called 5 per cent rebate clause of the tariff law granting a reduction of duties to that amount on goods imported in American ships, was sustained today by the customs court, which held also that the 5 per cent rebate must be granted on all goods imported in ships of those countries with which the United States has favored nation treaties.

As such treaties exist with the principal countries of the world, the actual effect of the decision is to reduce the customs revenue by a perceptible amount.

Next Refund \$15,000,000.

If the decision is sustained by the supreme court of the United States approximately \$15,000,000 in duties already collected must be refunded.

In a dissenting opinion Judge De Vries pointed out that the majority decision means that goods imported in favored nation countries will receive this reduction in customs duties. Five per cent of the estimated customs revenues for the present fiscal year would exceed \$11,000,000 and in view of the fact that total would grow to a greater proportion. Moreover, it was pointed out that the decision if it stands the test in the supreme court is retroactive to the extent that it applies to imports from the United States since approval of the Underwood tariff law more than two years ago included goods entered in 1911 and subsequently withdrawn without payment of this rebate.

May Affect Fiscal Policy.

Officials realize that a decision may have a profound effect upon the fiscal policy of the United States. At present the actual working of the law is such that the rebate is applied to goods imported in American ships only. It is estimated that the rebate on goods imported in American ships is about \$1,000,000. The majority decision would extend this rebate to goods imported in ships of favored nation countries. Today's decision of the customs court in part sustained the ruling of the board of general appraisers and held that the rebate clause in addition to its binding regarding goods from abroad, the court held that a reduction of 5 per cent in valorem as provided by the Cuban preferential treaty with the United States and to the further amount of a per cent from that amount.

Contention of Government.

The government importers and American and foreign ship owners were put to the test. The government held that the clause applied to goods imported in ships of favored nation countries, but that section must be held in favor of the ship owners. The government importers were interested particularly in the granting of the rebate to goods imported in American ships. The clause inoperative because of the conflict with existing treaties, and in conformity with the opinion of the board, has never been paid in any case. Although importers accepted the assessed value in many instances under protest, the main plea before the court on the part of American ship owners was that the United States is entitled to the rebate in its own right.

The Majority Decision.

In this connection the majority decision said:

By no department of the government have these provisions ever been repealed or denounced as unconstitutional or denied force and effect. It is certain that the majority decision during all the time since their negotiation has been regarded as settled and correct. To now hold them invalid for any reason in view of these circumstances would in any event be to defeat them in the act of the contentions of the department of state. The law is clear and the majority decision would be little less than an usurpation. Fortunately the duty of repudiating their own previous decision is not to be undertaken by the majority decision. It is now construed in the reasonable manner and binding force and declares in effect that the law shall be given effect in any and every case where it is applicable. ORLANDO CHOSEN BY PRESBYTERIANS

For the Next Meeting of the Southern General Assembly—Assembly Nears Adjournment.

Newport News, Va., May 26.—The general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the South, which met here today, has chosen Orlando, Fla., as the next meeting place. The action of the Synod of Arkansas in the Field case approved a telegram from the northern assembly regarding the resolution of the Field case. The La Fayette church case from New Orleans received the reports of the foreign missions narrative and systematic beneficence committees and an address by Rev. Dr. J. S. Ivory, representative of the assembly to the associate council of Presbyterian and reformed churches. The assembly dispersed with social diversions and held three sessions during the afternoon and night in hope of clearing up the docket in time to adjourn tomorrow afternoon or night. The commissioners worked at high speed throughout the day and disposed of much routine work in addition to the important matters transacted.

Orlando was the only city from which an invitation to hold the next assembly was received. Although other commissioners were prepared to invite the 1916 convention to their cities, Rev. Dr. J. W. Stagg, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Orlando, made an earnest plea for the next assembly to be held in Orlando. There was no opposition to the selection of that city and the vote was unanimous.

La Fayette Church Case.

The La Fayette church case from New Orleans has been followed with intense interest by the La Fayette Presbyterians and the action of the Northern assembly in paying the way for an amicable settlement of the difficulty was noted with deep gratification with the commissioners.

Some time ago Rev. John C. Barr, pastor of the La Fayette church, obtained a letter of dismission from the Southern Presbytery of New Orleans ostensibly to transfer to another presbytery, but with another presbytery of the Southern assembly. Within twenty-four hours however officials of the Northern assembly from Texas arrived in New Orleans and requested the La Fayette church in the Northern assembly installing Mr. Barr as pastor. The matter was brought before the assembly here several days ago and Rev. Dr. George T. Sumner of New Orleans was sent to the Northern assembly at Rochester, N. Y., to lay the case before that body. The telegram received today stated that the northern church was willing to arbitrate the case and settle it in any other amicable way which might prove satisfactory.

It is said now that the Northern and Southern Presbyteries of New Orleans will take up the matter and refer it to the arbitration of both sides. The affirmation of the act in the Synod of Arkansas is not to be held in that spirit unless the same was fitly done. Mr. Barr was dismissed. It is said that the La Fayette Presbytery will be permitted to install the church by the synod but advised from preaching. The case was brought before the assembly on the minister's behalf.

ANGLICAN ARCHBISHOPS CALL CHURCH TO ARMS

Urge Members to Make Every Sacrifice—German Spirit Menaces Christendom.

London, May 26.—The archbishops of Canterbury and York have issued the following joint pastoral letter which is to be read in all churches June 6:

"After ten months of war we see more clearly than at first the greatness and severity of the ordeal which is putting the spirit of our nation to the test.

The spirit betrayed against us threatens the very foundation of civilized life in Christendom. It wields an immense and ruthless power. It can only be decisively rolled back if we for our part concentrate the whole strength of body, mind and soul which our nation and our empire holds.

We solemnly call on all members of the church and urge upon all our citizens to meet with glad and unflinching response whatever demands of service or sacrifice the government decides to make. The great war righteously waged calls out that spirit which will sacrifice with a gladness and intensity which nothing can rival on behalf of righteousness. And in our country a cause there is nothing too dear or too sacred to be offered.

God has so taught us. Let us obey by what we give and by what we are. May His will be done."

Report of Narrative Committee.

The report of the narrative committee was submitted at the morning session by Rev. W. W. Donaldson, D. D., of Huntington, W. Va., and the report of the committee, on systematic finance by Rev. Dr. A. V. McCleary of Charlotte, N. C. The foreign missions report was read at the afternoon session and went over to the night meeting for discussion.

The narrative committee deals with the spiritual condition of the church and today's report again emphasized the spirit of evangelism and the incident in the assembly. Attention also was called to the large number of additions to the church on previous occasions during the year just closed. The report was adopted.

Among the recommendations of the systematic beneficence committee were the following:

That the campaign committee on stewardship be continued the four executive committees be urged to throw their influence in favor of the assembly's financial plan that all churches in the assembly be urged to adopt the plan that the four executive committees make appeals in the interest of the work they represent in all churches that have not adopted the assembly's plan.

Prolonged discussion of the recommendation against making special in the churches now operating under the assembly's plan ensued and this part of the report was adopted. A recommendation that a secretary of education be not appointed at this time was placed on docket for discussion in connection with the report on foreign missions.

Anti-Liquor Resolution.

Just before adjourning tonight the assembly unanimously adopted the following resolution against liquor and the liquor traffic:

"As the traffic in and use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage is the prolific cause of much crime, poverty and suffering in our land and as it costs the people so much money in criminal prosecution and the support of the victims of drink and as it is one of the greatest enemies of the church of Christ and as we are urged against its sale in I Cor. XI, 17, therefore in view of these terrible effects this general assembly hereby testifies against this evil and recommends to all our people the use of no alcoholic beverage for its banishment from the land."

HARDWARE MEN TO DEAL IN AUTO ACCESSORIES

San Francisco, Cal., May 26.—Distribution of a domestic car accessories now in the hands of manufacturers and specialty stores is to be taken over by American heavy hardware jobbers according to a resolution adopted here today in an executive session of the National Association of the American Iron, Steel and Heavy Hardware Association.

John C. Purdie, secretary of the association, said this action meant the elimination of the garage and special automobile repair man and the rehabilitation of the hardware shop as a decadent business since the advent of the automobile.

Mr. Purdie expressed the opinion that the displacement of the garage will mean lower repair prices on automobile tires.

EPISCOPALIANS PLEDGE SUPPORT TO WILSON

Chicago, May 26.—Loyalty to the nation and support to President Wilson was pledged today in resolutions adopted at the diocesan convention of the Episcopal church here.

The present catastrophe marks the breakdown of a civilization in which unscrupulous commercial competition and the resulting dynastic rivalries have prevailed.

We have faith to believe that in this most terrible of world wars God is working out His plans for a new conception of human brotherhood and liberty which shall annihilate men from the tyrannical influences of a bad past and set before them the freedom of the children of God.

The committee asked for \$2,500 in addition to the amount appropriated of \$4,000 for repairs and general improvements. They contended that the repair department could not do its work without material with which to carry on its work.

It was pointed out by the committee that several organizations of the city in making inspections of the school buildings have complained of the need of painting, plastering and general cleaning up of the buildings. They say that with the appropriation asked for they will be able to take care of many of these needs before the schools open next fall.

In twelve of the schools the heating plants are in bad condition and in many cases are entirely out of order. The committee reported and they asked an additional appropriation of \$4,000 with which to make these repairs during the vacation period.

Since many of the members of the council finance committee had already visited the Tenth street school and learned of the crowded condition and the need of repairs, the committee at an assembly hall they needed little argument from the board of education officers to convince them that school buildings are in need of repairs and an assembly hall.

On account of the crowded conditions at the school buildings it is necessary and the children have no room in the entire building in which all can be accommodated.

Will Abolish Double Sessions The budget committee announced that they had perfected plans by which all double sessions will be abandoned in the schools next fall if the council finance committee will increase their appropriation sufficiently to provide for the increase in the high schools.

Among other requests of the board of education the following were made: For additional lot at Capitol View \$3,000 for lot adjoining the Summer Hill school \$1,000 for lot at the W. F. Slaton school \$500.

In enlarging the several high schools the board of education requested the finance committee to include an appropriation of \$2,000 for desks. Chairman Edwin Johnson, of the finance committee, asked Chairman Green of the board of education finance committee what would be done if the school buildings were to be enlarged.

Chairman Green replied that it will go to the finance committee to get it up. Resident Guinn spoke at length on the needs of the schools and the importance of proper education for the children and he urged the committee to consider carefully every request made by the board before making up their budget for the next year.

Vocational School The importance of a vocational school for which an appropriation of \$50,000 was asked by the school finance committee was discussed by the board of education. The committee also requested that a vocational school be established in the city.

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CLEMENCY IS URGED FOR LEO M. FRANK BY GEORGIA SOCIETY

The Georgia society of New York composed of well-known Georgians who are now residents of New York has through its board of governors, forwarded to the state prison commission an appeal for the commutation of Leo Frank's death sentence.

The letter follows: To the Honorable Members of the Prison Commission of the State of Georgia: Through its board of governors the Georgia Society of the State of New York incorporated an association located in New York City whose membership is composed exclusively of Georgians (the descendants of Georgians and persons who have been educated in Georgia or shall have married a Georgian) wish to present to you this statement.

Now that the courts have passed upon the Frank case and the fate of Leo M. Frank is in the hands of the Prison Commission and the governor of our state, we deem it fitting to express our belief that the ends of justice would be best subserved by the commutation of the sentence of death of Leo M. Frank to that of life imprisonment.

We are led to this conclusion as the result of an examination of the facts of the case and the circumstances of the trial, as revealed in the public press, and more particularly in the opinion of Justice Holmes, and in view of a widespread sentiment throughout the United States indicating a general belief that the evidence against him was by no means conclusive and that the very horror of the crime, with which he stood charged, must necessarily have inflamed the sentiment of the community against him.

In stating this expression of our views we beg to assure your honorable commission that we are actuated by no motive beyond a desire that our state shall show to her sister states that Georgia administers an impartial justice and while strictly enforcing her laws gives to every accused man within her borders a due measure of mercy accompanied by the hope that his innocence may be ultimately established.

It is our belief that the evidence against him was by no means conclusive and that the very horror of the crime, with which he stood charged, must necessarily have inflamed the sentiment of the community against him.
