

GERMANY YIELDS TO UNITED STATES ON SUBMARINES

Kaiser's Ambassador Informs Secretary Lansing in Writing That Undersea Boats Will Sink No More Liners Without Warning.

TENSION IS RELAXED BY GERMANY'S ACTION

Germany to Send Formal Note of Disavowal and Offering Reparation for American Lives Lost—Outcome Is Hailed as Great Victory for American Diplomacy.

Washington, September 1.—Strained relations between the United States and Germany over the submarine warfare apparently passed into history today after Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, informed Secretary Lansing in writing that prior to the sinking of the Arabic his government had decided that its submarines should sink no more liners without warning.

Secretary Lansing said in a formal statement that the letter "appears to be a recognition of the fundamental principle for which we have contended." He immediately sent the communication to the white house, and discussed it in cheerful vein with his callers, who included Chief Justice White, Secretary McAdoo and Senator Tillman, of South Carolina.

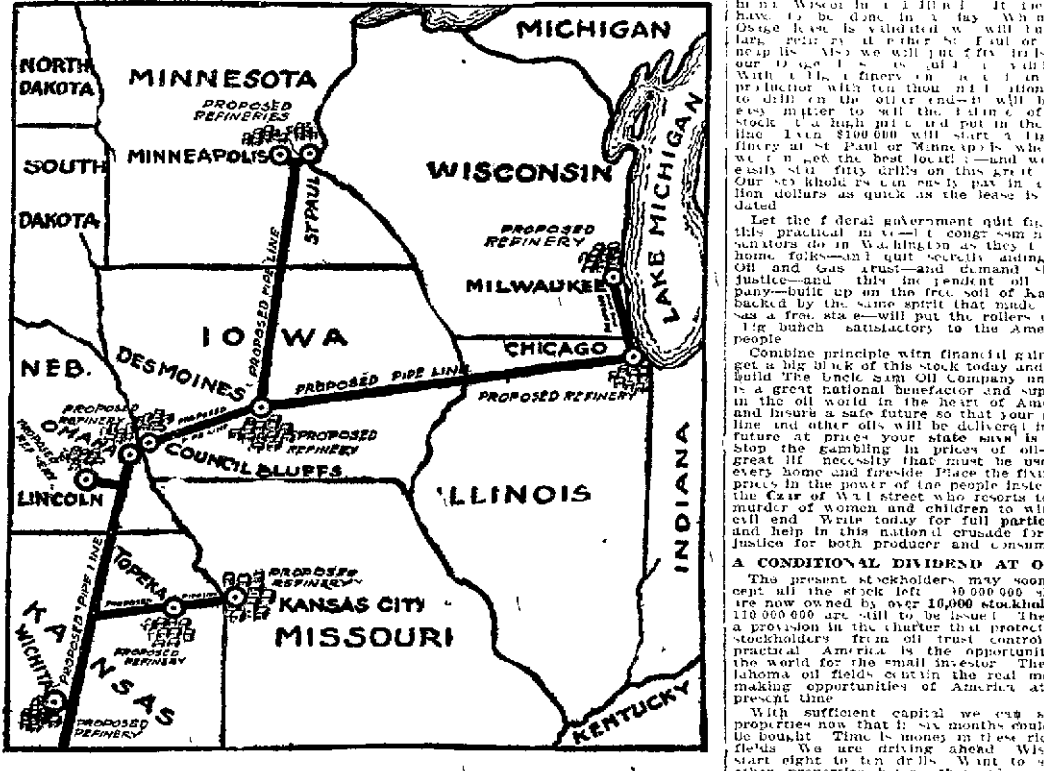

A YEAR AGO AND--NOW.

Looking back just one year, the south has every reason to congratulate itself upon the evolution which has taken place in conditions surrounding the market for cotton and, logically, therefore, as to those relating to business generally.

One year ago brought the end of the first month of the European war. The stock and cotton exchanges were closed, the financial world had been stampeded and business generally was in chaos.

In the beginning of this financial cataclysm the south was floundering, knowing not where to turn. The cotton states were pictured as standing upon the curbstone with hat in hand, in the humiliating attitude of beggary, destitution and desolation.

Business in every line was affected by being cut to a minimum; traveling men remained at home, mills, shops and factories of all sorts curtailed their output and reduced their forces, railroads laid off their hands by the thousand, and the south throughout its length and breadth was reduced to a basis of economy such as it had scarcely known before even in panic periods.

What really happened was, as gradual readjustment came about, that we shipped approximately as much cotton as during the year before and with every business settled upon the basis of rock bottom economy, conditions began slowly but substantially to improve.

Providence came to the rescue as it often does, assisting even well intentioned crop curtailment, so that today we have a crop of something like 4,000,000 bales less than that of 1914. This crop difference practically equalizes the surplus carried over from last year and today our cotton is selling at above 9 cents.

Never in the history of the south has a crop of cotton been raised as cheaply as that of 1915. Fertilizer expense was reduced 40 per cent or more, labor and implements and mules and, in fact, everything that enters into the making of the crop, cost less than ordinarily.

If the situation were figured out in accurate and ultimate detail, it would unquestionably be found that 1915 cotton at 9 cents is bringing a better net result than the 11-cent rate existing just before the declaration of war when we were picturing just ahead of the most prosperous winners the south had ever known.

And readjustment has brought us to this very gratifying basis, notwithstanding the British contraband order whose removal, if achieved, would still further strengthen the market and give us the most remunerative crop we have known in years.

Even under adverse conditions we have achieved restoration. We are back today at the point where, thirteen months ago, we were looking forward to the best and biggest business season in our history. Its

coming was delayed by a year, it is before us now.

Conditions are ripe for as active and prosperous a fall and winter as business could wish or demand. It will be ours to the full extent that we make it so. We should get ready for it and help build our success, already full of promise, will be the greater in fulfillment as we work to back it up.

NO DOUBLE SESSIONS.

There is gratifying reassurance in the announcement of Superintendent Landrum, of the city's schools, that there will be no double sessions, even temporarily, upon the opening of the schools this month.

Where additional rooms, planned to meet and avert this situation, are not finally completed, the classes will be delayed for a few days, rather than put pupils, parents and teachers to the annoying inconvenience so well remembered by those who had to contend with double sessions during the last scholastic year.

The Constitution, the Atlanta School Improvement Association and other organizations made their fight last winter and spring, largely to rid the school system and its patrons of this nuisance which was one of the chief evidences of school inefficiency.

That fight was won in June, when the city council found and appropriated \$85,000 to rehabilitate the system to the point where it could meet the demand upon it. Assurance, the most positive, was then given that double sessions would be banished for all time.

Superintendent Landrum's announcement is merely reassuring. The Constitution pointed out in June that the time was short, and if conditions were to be remedied in time for the opening of the schools upon the usual date in September, quick work would be necessary.

The time has been barely sufficient to complete the necessary work. In a few instances new schoolrooms will scarcely be ready for their classes on Monday, September 13. It will, however, mean a difference of only a few days at most, and it is better to wait than to inaugurate the year by going back to the obnoxious plan of double sessions.

Atlanta hopes trusts and believes this double session business has been abolished from her schools for all time. School patrons do not wish to be reminded of it by even the most transitory restoration.

MIRACLE OF THE MUMMY.

The ancients of the earth are daily gaining credit with the moderns for having known a thing or two in advance of their time. Discoveries of the archaeologists are all in their favor.

A Kansas dispatch to The New York Sun tells of a mummy discovered in an Aztec ruin. Within it was found, sealed, an Indian jar containing a few grains of ancient Indian corn. The archaeologists figure the corn was at least 1,000 years old. And here follows the story:

It was discovered last spring by a Baptist preacher—only a few grains of it. To William E. Kelley, a Hutchinson (Kansas) city official, ten grains of the mummy's corn were given. Mr. Kelley planted them in his back yard with results as follows:

The corn looks like ordinary field corn, but the stalks are much taller and the ears smaller while the kernels are yellow with a bluish tinge. It has been offered as high as \$1 for a kernel and believe I can sell every kernel for \$1.00. Mr. Kelley figures he will have 1,000 kernels.

Naturally there will be a new effort to unearth more mummies, in the hope of a richer harvest of this miraculous corn, which after the repose of a thousand years, may bring a thousand dollars to a back yard agriculturist of Kansas.

When any law is only partially enforced the respect of the people for the law is soon lost and that is not going to be my case."

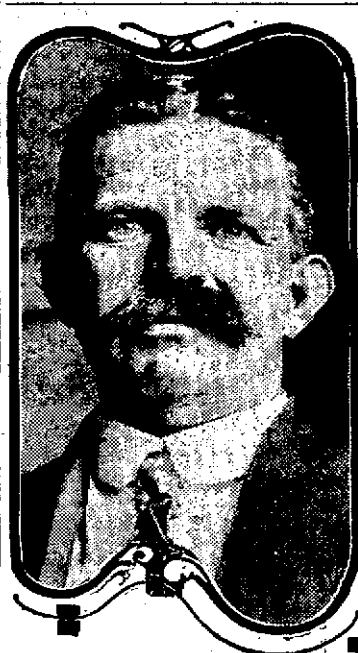

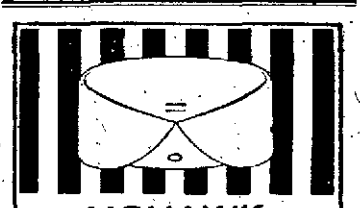

WILSON IS PLANNING FOR NATIONAL DEFENSE

Will Urge Economy in Certain Lines to Leave Money for "Preparedness" Program.

Washington, September 1—President Wilson, it was said authoritatively tonight, believes he can proceed with more freedom in the development of his national defense plans now that danger of serious trouble with Germany apparently is removed. There will be no suspension now, he believes, that the plans are directed at any one nation.

The president's idea, it was said, is to prepare a program for several years in advance. Expenditures are to be kept as low as the president thinks consistent with the plans to be presented to him by Secretaries Garrison and Daniels.

Economy in appropriations for little used army posts, navy yards, rivers and harbors and public buildings will be recommended to congress by President Wilson in order to leave the money necessary for an adequate program of national defense. This information came today from a high administration source.

Chairman Tillman, of the senate naval affairs committee, discussed national defenses today with the president. Later he said he favored a reasonable increase in the navy and would support the president's recommendations. Senator Tillman said he had not decided exactly what increases were needed and was willing to let the president decide. He said the program would be mapped out by him and the president. The president's point from Secretary Daniels had discussed the subject with himself and Chairman Farnett, of the house naval affairs committee.

It was stated authoritatively by administration officials today that there is no basis for reports that the president has decided to recommend army and navy appropriations totaling \$500,000,000. One cabinet member said he did not believe the amount to be asked for would be that large.
